Karen MacInerney is the bestselling author of fourteen novels and several short stories, and her victims number well into the double digits. Her first novel, *Murder on the Rocks*, was nominated for an Agatha Award, and her book *On the Prowl* was nominated for a PEARL award by her readers; she also received the SAGE Award for Mentoring Authors from the Barbara Burnett Smith foundation. When she's not working on her next book, she teaches writing and coaches aspiring authors. She lives in Austin, Texas.

April 21, 2016 — We'll meet at Catherine Luckey's home to discuss *The Invisible Bridge*, by Julie Orringer

Paris, 1937. Andras Lévi, a Hungarian-Jewish architecture student, arrives from Budapest with a scholarship, a single suitcase, and a mysterious letter he promised to deliver. But when he falls into a complicated relationship with the letter's recipient, he becomes privy to a secret that will alter the course of his — and his

family's — history. From the small Hungarian town of Konyár to the grand opera houses of Budapest and Paris, from the lonely chill of Andras's room on the rue des Écoles to the deep and enduring connection he discovers on the rue de Sévigné, from the despair of Carpathian winter to an unimaginable life in forced labor camps and beyond, *The Invisible Bridge* tells the story of a love tested by disaster, of brothers whose bonds cannot be broken, of a family shattered and remade in history's darkest hour, and of the dangerous power of art in a time of war. Expertly crafted, magnificently written, emotionally haunting, and impossible to put down, *The Invisible Bridge* resoundingly confirms Julie Orringer's place as one of today's most vital and commanding young literary talents. May 19, 2016 — Meet at Bon Air Presbyterian Church, 9201 Huguenot Road, Richmond, VA 23235, Carol Stephens and DeAnn Lineberry Hostesses *All the Light We Cannot See*, by Anthony Doerr (2014, 545 pages). *Winner of 2015 Pulitzer Prize in Fiction; recommended by Karen Winne, Catherine Luckey, and consensus of many other Book Group members.* Does the world need yet another novel about WWII? It does when the novel is as inventive and beautiful as this one by Anthony Doerr. In fact, *All the Light We Cannot See* -- while set mostly in Germany and France before and during the war -- is not really a “war novel”. The author focuses on the interior lives of his two characters, a blind 14-year-old French girl who flees to the countryside when her father disappears from Nazi-occupied Paris and a gadget-obsessed German orphan whose skills admit him to a brutal branch of Hitler Youth. This is a book you read for the beauty of Doerr's writing and for the way he understands and cherishes the magical obsessions of childhood

Public Policy - Kathy Kelley Chair

Barb Strohman, Carol Stephens, Deniese Melenbrink, Georgiana Ball, Pat Fishback, Elizabeth Smith, Ann Sterling and Kathy Kelley had a very busy two months attending meetings at the GA, the Women's Roundtable, and contacting the delegates and senators during the General Assembly. Unfortunately some bills were not passed.

These bills which passed in the Senate were left in the Privileges and Elections Committee in the House:

SB59 - . Provides criteria for the General Assembly to observe in drawing districts, including respect for political boundaries, equal population, racial and ethnic fairness, contiguity, compactness, and communities of interest. Use of political data or election results is prohibited unless necessary to determine if racial or ethnic minorities are able to elect candidates of their choice. This bill incorporates **SB495**.

SJ1 – would ratify the ERA.

HB1315 – Any legislation introduced in the House or Senate must have a recorded vote. This bill was referred to the House Rules Committee which ironically tabled it with a voice vote.

The following Items (that fall under the Public Policy stands of AAUW VA) below are taken from the Sunday March 11th *Richmond Times Dispatch*.

A bill that would have banned most abortions after 20 weeks did not advance from the House.

Advocates for transparency beat back a number of proposed bills restricting the people's right to know.

Three bills were passed that were part of Governor McAuliffe's Task Force on combatting campus sexual violence.

Lawmakers defeated legislation that would have put a charter school amendment to the VA Constitution before voters in November.

No bills were passed that would regulate key aspects of the health care industry.

Lawmakers backed a bill designed to help prepare students for technology jobs by calling for the Board of Education to incorporate computer science, computational thinking and coding into the Standards of Learning curriculum. Local school boards also would need to develop and implement computer education for students from K-12.
