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
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2018 AAUW of Virginia Woman of Achievement Dr. Christine Mann Darden





You didn't see Dr. Darden in the movie Hidden Figures, which focuses on the pioneering work of three African-American women who helped get the

From Your Co-Presidents

Never Sit Down!

n November 12, 2017, a number of AAUW members attended the Night of Terror Commemoration to remember the incarceration of 32 suffragists who picketed the White House in 1917 to advocate for the right to vote. The event was sponsored by the Workhouse Arts Center and Turning Point Suffragist Memorial Association. Each element of the three-hour program was a vivid reminder of the courage, sacrifices, and diligence of the women, who 100 years ago fought for the right of women in our country to vote. These 32 women, who were imprisoned and tortured in the Occoquan Workhouse, risked their lives and their reputations. When they were told to go home, they replied, "No!" When they were told to be quiet, they replied, "No!" When they were told to eat, they replied, "No!" When their banners were torn and taken down, they repaired them and put them back up...over and over again.

One of the songs sung at the event was an adaption of a traditional song, "Sit Down, Sister," which celebrates the heroic women who worked for women's rights. Those women worked for their freedom to vote and ours today. Those women worked for and cherished their rights and ours. They kept working for decades. They were ridiculed, spit on, pushed, beaten up, force fed.

The song ends with: "I'll never sit down, I'm working to make the world what I want it to be. I'll never sit down. I'm standing up for my equality. I'll raise my voice loud and clear. I'll never sit down! Never! No!"

Each of us knows this well: The battle for equity is ongoing. AAUW has been in it since 1881. We will never forget those who came before us: Sojourner Truth, Susan B. Anthony, Elizabeth Cady Stanton, Lucy Burns, Alice Paul, and others. Like them, we must never sit down! As an AAUW member you are adding your voice to the fight for equity right now. Invite others to participate!

Mini-Grants Awarded to Nine Branches

The state board initially approved a total of \$1,500 for public policy mini-grants for 2017-2018. Because of the quality of the applications submitted, the board approved an additional \$300. By the time the October 1, 2017, application deadline rolled around, nine branches submitted applications representing seven projects. Congratulations to the following branches who were awarded mini-grants:

- Alexandria Branch-\$300 for a social media and email campaign about AAUW public policy priorities, in collaboration with the Northern Virginia Community College Center for Women, Gender, and Social Equity.
- Fairfax City, McLean Area, Springfield-Annandale, and Vienna Area Branches-\$400 towards STEMtastics 2018. This is the fifth year for this event for middle school girls, held at Northern Virginia Community College in collaboration with Systemic Solutions.
- Harrisonburg Branch-\$75 towards a Women's Leadership Conference at the James Madison University (JMU) School of Business for women students, and \$100 toward the sixth annual Expanding Your Horizons STEM Conference at JMU, which was started by a branch member.
- Suffolk Branch-\$300 so that they can participate in "Suffolk Rocks," a community event, in collaboration with their affiliate at Paul D. Camp Community College, where individuals and organizations paint and hide rocks displaying information about AAUW around town so others can find them.
- Smith Mountain Branch-\$225 to send a fourthgrade girl to the Science Girls! Camp at the Science Museum in Roanoke in June 2018.
- Wytheville Branch-\$400 towards the branch's fourth annual STEM Train event for middle school girls, held in collaboration with Wytheville Community College.

Public Policy

PROPOSED 2018–2020 PUBLIC POLICY PRIORITIES

The AAUW of Virginia board recommends approval, without change, of the current 2016-2018 state public policy priorities as the 2018-2020 state public policy priorities. These are listed below and accurately reflect the advocacy efforts of our members throughout the state. There will be opportunity for discussion and amendment from the floor at the annual business meeting in Portsmouth prior to being placed on the ballot for members to vote.

- Equitable access and advancement in employment for women, including vigorous enforcement of employment anti-discrimination statutes and adoption of additional protections to advance gender pay equity
- Opposition to the use of public funds for nonpublic elementary and secondary education and to charter schools that do not adhere to the same civil rights and accountability standards required of other public schools

- Access to quality, affordable health care and family planning support, including individual choice in reproductive decisions and equity in women's health research and treatment
- 4. Freedom from violence and fear of violence, including bullying, hate crimes, sexual harassment, and human trafficking
- Greater availability of and access to a high standard of benefits and policies that promote work-life balance, including access to quality, affordable dependent care and paid family leave
- 6. Increased support for programs that break through barriers for women and girls in STEM.
- Enforcement of and full access to civil and constitutional rights, including protection of voting rights. Ensure that legislative districts are fairly drawn and government processes are transparent
- 8. Enforcement of Title IX and all other civil rights laws pertaining to education
- 9. Passage and ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment

Oberlin College, Oberlin, OH 1969, BA in Sociology; Rivier College, Nashua, NH 1984, M Ed.

I have taught special education students of all grade levels in all subjects in MN, CT, NH, and GA, for over 30 years. I

served as a mentor teacher and the autism specialist in our high school during the last three years of my full-time teaching career. I served as the Cobb County Assoc. of Educators (CCAE) president (part-time salaried position) 2002-2004. I retired in 2012 and moved to Richmond, VA.

I have been active in many non-profit organizations over my lifetime including food co-ops, racial integration projects, alternative education efforts, League of Women Voters (LWV) and political organizations. I joined AAUW in 2003 after being chosen by the Cobb County GA Branch as Woman of the Year for my service to teachers and students as the CCAE President. While in Cobb County AAUW, I served as program chair, membership chair, and president of our local branch. I received the 2008-2009 AAUW Georgia Achievement Award. Susan joined AAUW in 2007 as a member of the Spring-field-Annandale Branch, and her interest in greater activism on women's issues and AAUW's important role in this effort has grown since then. She serves as the branch public policy chair and the leader of the branch's evening

book group. Susan served for three years (2015-2017) on a multi-branch committee supporting STEMtastics. In 2017, she was elected to serve as the Northern District co-representative. Sylvia Rogers

Sylvia Rogers, an AAUW member since 1998, joined the Harrisonburg Branch in 2014 and is completing her second term as president. As the current NW district representative to the Virginia state board, she serves on the public policy committee. Sylvia chaired

the 2015 Virginia state conference in Charlottesville. Recently, she addressed the issue of pay equity on the "Fight for Equality and Economic Security for Women" program sponsored by "Staunton Local and Vocal," AAUW, the National Women's Law Center, and Planned Parenthood.

Sylvia taught 28 years in the Bay Area, first at Stanford University as a teaching assistant (1977-1985), then at Notre Dame de Namur University (NDNU) (1986-2005). At NDNU, she held academic and administrative positions, including chair of the Humanities Division (1992-2002), director of the Master of Arts in English Program (1997-2005) and the Freshman/Sophomore Interdisciplinary Program (2002-2005), and president of the faculty senate (2001 -2004). At NDNU, Sylvia was an "early adopter" of online instructional technologies. As a professor emerita teaching part-time in James Madison University's English department, she offered undergraduate online and traditional courses (2005-2009). Sylvia holds a BS in pre-med and English (Rollins College), an MA in late 19th century and early modern literature (Boston University), and a PhD in medieval English literature (Stanford University). She enjoys traveling, trying new recipes, researching

family history, and curling up with a good book.

Patsy is a native of North Carolina, but has lived in Virginia since graduating from college. She joined AAUW in the '70s when her college roommate invited her to attend a group in Virginia Beach "that you will find interesting." She has held just about every branch position available since then.

At its December general meeting, the **Springfield-Annandale Branch** heard **Brian Cannon**,

executive director of OneVirginia2021, talk about redistricting in Virginia. OneVirginia2021 is a coalition of concerned citizens from all over the Commonwealth working to "reenergize forces for fair, non-partisan redistricting." The group has a multi-partisan approach, believing that state and congressional districts belong to the citizens of Virginia and not to any legislator, political party or interest group. The mission is to "advocate for the adoption of an amendment to the Virginia constitution that will establish an independent, impartial commission to apply a fair and transparent process in drawing political districts after the 2020 census."

Mr. Cannon provided a detailed presentation on the

factors that lead to gerrymandered districts including personal factors, bipartisan trading, use of consumer data, and inclusion of prison populations (to boost numbers but not numbers of voters). As a result, electoral districts no longer represent communities and there is little or no competition. OneVirginia2021's goal is a 2018 ballot referendum calling for an independent commission. We will be following this issue closely.



A Pre-Conference Treat—Meet the Founding Father of Portsmouth

With special arrangement, we have contracted for walking tours with Eric Price, who portrays Col. William Crawford, the founder of Portsmouth in 1752. It has been identified as an easy stroll.

NOTICE: Unfortunately Eric Price passed away as we were getting ready to go to press. This tour will not be offered. However an afternoon walk with a city resident and AAUW member, **Sherry Warren** will take its place. There will be no fee and you can sign up at the conference.



Please join us for an afternoon walk on the nearby streets of the city, often called the Jewel of the Elizabeth River. Then you will be free to socialize with other conferees at the hotel. (This was a frequent request on the 2016 evaluations.)

The Light Ship Museum is within sight of the Renaissance.

It functioned like a lighthouse on the Elizabeth River. The U.S. Lightship Service was started in 1820. Like lighthouses and buoys,

lightships were navigational aids. The lights atop their masts were similar to those in lighthouses, but their portability made them much more versatile. The Lightship PORTSMOUTH was built in 1915. She served for 48 years off the coasts of Virginia, Delaware and Massachusetts helping mariners avoid dangerous shoals or enter safely into harbors at night. In 1964, she was retired to Portsmouth, Virginia and renamed according to the custom of naming lightships after the site where they are stationed. In 1989, the Lightship PORTSMOUTH was designated a National Historic Landmark. Now a museum, the ship's quarters are fitted out realistically and filled with fascinating artifacts, uniforms, photographs, models, and more.





Elizabeth River Ferry: Portsmouth to Norfolk

There are two ferry stops in Portsmouth. The first is on High Street, the second stop is at North Landing Dock, very near to the Renaissance Hotel. If you're getting on at High Street, there's a ticket machine on the corner of High Street and Water Street where you can pay by credit card. If you're boarding at the North Landing Dock, there's a visitor center where you can buy tickets during the day. You can also purchase tickets on board the ferry - exact change only. Luncheon Speaker Edith Mayo

"Treasures for the Nation's Attic: Collecting Women's History for the Smithsonian"



Edith Mayo is curator emeritus in political and women's history at the Smithsonian Institution's National Museum of American History, where she worked for more than 40 years as a curator and historian. A graduate of George Washington University in American studies, she was a member of Phi Beta Kappa. Ms. Mayo has curated major exhibitions on political history, voting rights, and women's history including The Right to Vote (1972), a history of voting rights in the U. S.; We the People (1975) on the American people and their government; We'll Never Turn Back (1980) an exhibition on civil rights; and We the People: Winning the Vote (1987), exploring formal and informal constitutional processes over 200 years. Ms. Mayo curated the major exhibition, From Parlor to Politics: Women and

Reform in America: 1890-1925 on women's central contributions to political reform in the 20th century, and reconceptualized the Smithsonian's famous first ladies exhibition entitled, First Ladies: Political Role and Public Image (1992). In 2002, she completed a major traveling exhibition, Enterprising Women, on women business entrepreneurs, for the Radcliffe Institute of Harvard. She has published widely on the history of women and first ladies, as well as on campaign appeals to women. Ms. Mayo will share her reminiscences of collecting women's history from the suffrage movement to the first ladies' gowns.

Meet LAF Plaintiff Zoe Spencer, Ph.D.

AAUW LAF plaintiff Zoe Spencer, Ph.D., is one of four female employees at Virginia State University who filed a lawsuit against the school (November 2016), alleging gender pay discrimination, sexual harassment, and a pattern of retaliation against anyone who tries to speak out.

"AS I GOT OLDER, I DIDN'T LIKE TO BE TOLD I COULDN'T DO SOMETHING BECAUSE I'M A GIRL. I THOUGHT, IF I'M PHYSICALLY UNABLE, THAT'S ONE THING – BUT NOT JUST BECAUSE I AM A GIRL!"

In a high school geometry class, she discovered her love of math. Christine graduated high school as the class valedictorian in 1958, subsequently receiving a scholarship to attend Hampton

University, (then known as Hampton Institute). Christine graduated from Hampton with a BS in mathematics in 1962. She also earned a teaching certificate, and taught high school mathematics for a brief time. In 1963, Mann married Walter L. Darden Jr., a middle school science teacher. In 1965, she became a research assistant at Virginia State College, studying aerosol physics. At Virginia State, Darden earned an MS in 1967 and taught mathematics there.

That same year she was hired by NASA as a data analyst at Langley Research Center. Darden started in the "computer pool," performing complex calculations as a computer for engineers. These analysts became known as "human computers." She began automating the process by writing computer programs. It was here that Katherine Johnson, one of the "hidden figures" took Christine under her wing. Years later, she confidently approached her supervisor to ask

why men, with the same educational background as her (MS in applied mathematics), were being hired as engineers. Stumped by her question and impressed by her skills, her supervisor transferred her to the engineering section, where she was one of few female aerospace engineers at NASA

during that time, working on supersonic flight. Her early findings in the 1960s and 1970s resulted in a revolution of aerodynamics design to produce low-boom sonic effects. In 1983, Darden earned a PhD in engineering from George Washington University and became known for her research as "one of NASA's preeminent experts on supersonic flight and sonic booms."

In 1989, Darden was appointed as leader of the Sonic Boom Team, a subsidiary of the High Speed Research (HSR) Program. On the Sonic Boom

Team, she worked on designs to decrease the negative effects of sonic booms, such as noise pollution and the depletion of the ozone layer. Her team tested new wing and nose designs for supersonic aircraft. She also designed a computer program to simulate sonic booms.

Darden wrote more than 50 articles in the general field of aeronautical design, specializing in supersonic flow and flap design, as well as the prediction and minimization of sonic booms. She advanced to become the first African-American woman at Langley to be promoted into the Senior Executive Service, the top rank in the federal civil service. In March



2007, Darden retired from NASA as director of the Office of Strategic Communication and Education.

Dr. Darden and her husband (Walter) of 53 years are the proud parents of three adult daughters, five grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.


The rules to participate are simple:
