
Celebrating Visionary Women 1920-2020

now have three women members of Congress from Virginia, 30 women in the state House of Delegates, and 11 women in the State Senate. The speaker of the Virginia House is now a woman, and so is the president *pro tempore* of the Virginia Senate.

What will this new decade bring? During this last decade we have seen a backlash against the progress women have made in many areas, but in one area, the MeToo movement, a message that the old ways of doing things is no longer the accepted norm. What old way of doing things will be changed this new decade? Will we see a major thrust toward pay equity and more glass ceilings being broken? Virginia has seen a new wave of women legislators both statewide and in federal offices. Will we see our legislature be closer to 50% women by the end of this decade? These are exciting times - - step up and be part of this new decade!

AAUW-VA 2019-20 Mini-Grant Awards

This fall the Mini-Grant Committee received four applications from three branches and awarded grants to all.

Smith Mountain Branch proposed funding for a Science Camp for Girls which will enable two girls from Franklin County and two girls from Bedford County elementary schools to attend the annual STEM camp in July 2020 and pay for transportation there and back (\$500.00).

Smith Mountain Branch also requested support for the *Can I Join Your Club?* project scheduled for February 2020. One hundred and five copies of *Can I Join Your Club?* will be distributed to 2nd grade classes in the three counties surrounding Smith Mountain Lake. AAUW volunteers will read the book to the students and coordinate discussions about its diversity and inclusion themes (\$500.00).

For its 30th SUCCESS! Conference in March 2020, **Woodbridge Branch** requested funding for shipping resources from national AAUW for the participants about STEM, pay equity, ERA policies, and strategies for preventing bullying and sexual violence (\$200.00).

In support of the 2020 annual James Madison University STEM Conference in March, **Harrisonburg Branch**, as a university partner and co-sponsor of the event, requested funds that will be directed toward workshop supplies for the middle school-age girls from Virginia and other states who will be in attendance (\$100.00).

Please join the Mini-Grant Committee in congratulating the three branches and everyone involved in organizing and conducting these worthwhile projects.

January 15, 2020 - a red-letter day in Richmond! A new day, a new month, a new year, a new decade, a new ERA! Virginia's House of Delegates and Senate voted to ratify the ERA, making Virginia the 38th and last state needed to ratify the amendment to the U. S. Constitution. AAUW of Virginia was proudly present. Nearly 40 volunteers from 13 branches gathered in Richmond for our first 2020 State Lobby Day. Little did we know when we scheduled this first Lobby Day of this General Assembly session that our visit would coincide with Virginia's approval of the ERA!

Months of preparations for this year's State Lobby Day included congratulatory letters to all new and returning state legislators, research on legislators' positions and proposed bills, and production of an AAUW-VA trifold pamphlet with key facts about the gender pay gap. The night before Lobby Day, AAUW-VA hosted a reception in honor of Virginia's women legislators. The Greater Richmond Branch provided a bountiful table of hors d'oeuvres for attendees among whom were seasoned, as well as freshmen legislators from both parties, and Lobby Day participants.

Earlier that day, AAUW-VA met with Governor Ralph Northam for a substantive conversation on pay equity and his legislative agenda that includes passage of the ERA, raising the minimum wage, sensible gun safety, and support for teachers in pre-school and higher education. We invited the governor to issue a proclamation to the Commonwealth on Equal Pay Day, March 31, 2020, which he accepted.

Members then visited the offices of nearly 70 delegates and senators and left folders with AAUW information about the gender pay gap. The *pièce de résistance* was the opportunity to watch the historic ERA vote in the House and Senate galleries and overflow rooms. It was a joyous occasion!

Members returned to Richmond for a second Lobby Day on February 12th. We continued to engage with legislators on AAUW's public policy priorities and made our voices heard yet again.

Call for Proposed State Bylaws Amendments and Proposed Resolutions

A call for the submission of proposed AAUW of Virginia Bylaws amendments and resolutions to be considered at the AAUW of Virginia Annual Business Meeting on April 18, 2020, was published in the fall issue of the Virginia *Vision*, with a deadline of December 1, 2019. No submissions were received.

AAUW of Virginia Board Proposed Amendment to the Bylaws

The AAUW of Virginia Board at its July 28, 2019, meeting approved a proposed amendment to the AAUW of Virginia Bylaws that is being presented at the AAUW Annual Business Meeting on April 18, 2020, which would delete Virginia's half-price dues discount for new members joining a branch between January 1st and March 15th. The proposed amendment will be voted on under the One Member, One Vote procedure.

Annual IRS Form 990-N Information

All AAUW branches and the state organization submitted the Form 990-N information to AAUW for filing with the Internal Revenue Service.

Virginia Dedicates Women's Monument

Several AAUW of Virginia members attended the dedication of the first monument honoring women in Virginia at the State Capitol in Richmond on October 14th.

Governor Ralph Northam welcomed the crowd: "Today, we come together to honor the vital role that women have played in Virginia's history. This monument is...the

first monument in the nation to celebrate both the individual and collective accomplishments of women over four centuries."

Officially titled "Virginia Women's Monument:

Voices from the Garden" the monument consists of a Wall of Honor inscribed with the names of 230 prominent Virginia women, surrounding 12 statues of Virginia women who have made significant (but previously unrecognized) contributions to the state.

Seven statues were unveiled at the dedication: Adèle Clark, suffragist and artist; Cockacoeske, Pamunkey chieftain; Laura Copenhaver, entrepreneur in the textile industry; Mary Draper Ingles, frontierswoman; Elizabeth Keckly, seamstress and confidante to Mary Todd Lincoln; Anne Burras Laydon, Jamestown colonist; and Virginia Randolph, educator. I Love a Parade!



AAUW of Virginia has been invited to partner with William & Mary's Society of 1918 to celebrate the 100th anniversary of women getting the vote. The Society of 1918, an organization which promotes en-

gagement, leadership, and philanthropy of William & Mary (W&M) alumnae, was founded in celebration of the 100th anniversary of W&M's admitting women to its student body.

This is the plan: Members of AAUW of Virginia will march in the homecoming parade along with members of the Society of 1918. While marching with Society members, AAUW of Virginia will have its own banner. Let us wear 1920s style garb -- long skirts, long-sleeved blouses or jackets, black or white, depending on the temperature, and big hats. Because it will be October, let's wear black. I have noticed in recent photos that some women are in long pants and they seem to blend with the group.

The parade will be on Friday, October 16, 2020, begin-

ning at 4:30 p.m. Its distance is about one mile; it occurs on Richmond Road in Williamsburg, beginning at Boundary and ending at W&M Hall. Most participants bow out after the judges' stand which is near the Alumni House. We are extending a special invitation to AAUW of Virginia members who are W&M alumnae, but this parade is for all of us who value our right to vote and want to honor those who helped make that possible.

The state board has given its nod to this which makes it a state event. Please join us. We are partnering with the W&M Society to have a large group of marchers and a crowd lining the parade route. Successful parades involve many people. Will you please talk it up in your branches and encourage each other to be a part of this? By July and August, I would like to know who plans to come. I will tell you where we are to assemble. Please keep me informed, and feel free to ask questions.



AAUW of Virginia 2020 Women

of Achievement



Senator Janet Howell exemplifies the word "achievement." As a volunteer, she first became a community leader: PTA president, Reston Community Association president, chair of the State Board of Social Services. In 1992 her leadership abilities and expertise led her to the Virginia Senate. In her eighth term and second in seniority in

the Senate, she is now the first woman to chair the Finance and Appropriations Committee, one of the most powerful positions in the Senate. She also serves on Education and Health, Privileges and Elections, and the Rules standing committees.

Senator Howell is one of Virginia's most influential senators. Her priorities have been education, children and families, and equal rights for women, including reproductive choice and the ERA. She is also credited with major legal reforms. She headed the overhaul of Virginia's family violence laws and spearheaded mental health law reform following the VA Tech tragedy.

Her outstanding career has resulted in numerous awards: National Child Advocate of the Year (American Academy of Pediatrics), several times "Senator of the Year" (Virginia Sheriffs), "Legislator of the Year" (both Virginia Housing Coalition and Victims and Witnesses of Crime organizations), "Lifetime Achievement Honoree" (Northern Virginia Technology Council), "Distinguished Leadership Award" (Northern Virginia Transportation Alliance), and "Champion of Justice" (Commonwealth Attorneys Association), among others.

Adding to her achievements, last year Senator Howell authored a children's book, *Leading the Way: Women in Power*. She wanted girls to learn about women who ignored obstacles to lead the way to improve our political system. It features 50 American women who stood up and blazed trails and even includes a guide for budding activists. A panel at Book Expo in New York with Susan Rice and Samantha Power highlighted the book.

A graduate of Oberlin College (BA government) and the University of Pennsylvania (MA international relations), Senator Howell has been a trail blazer herself during a life of achievement.

Ana Humphrey began dreaming about doing scientific research when she was in the 6th grade and met the girl who won the first-place prize in the Intel Science Talent Search. The Talent Search, a program of the Society for Science & the Public, begun in 1942 as the Westinghouse Science Talent Search, is considered "the na-

tion's oldest and most prestigious science and mathematics competition for high school seniors." When Ana embarked on her own scientific research, she began receiving prestigious national and international awards. One of her research projects, ColiFind, a digital image analysis application that identifies E. coli colonies in water quality tests, was the Virginia State Winner and Grand Prize runner-up at the 2017 U.S. Stockholm Junior Water Prize, and took first place in the category of Math and Computer Science at the 2017 National Junior Science and Humanities Symposium. Her research on exoplanets outside of our solar system won Best of Category in Physics and Astronomy at the 2018 Intel International Science and Engineering Fair.

In 2018, Ana also received a Virginia Governor's STEM Phenom Award, which is awarded to a student "who applied STEM principles for exceptional ends to make the world a better place." The award recognized Ana's Colifind app and her work as founder and president of the Watershed Warriors Initiative. The Initiative is an organization that writes and teaches hands-on environmental STEM lessons to elementary school students from mostly low-income and minority communities. She is passionate about sharing her love of space with students and has taught multiple classes on astrophysics and exoplanets at a local elementary school. By 2019, Ana was a National Merit Scholar, high school senior, and valedictorian at T.C. Williams High School, the public high school in Alexandria. Her scientific research on exoplanets earned her the first place \$250,000 prize in what is now the Regeneron Science Talent Search, surpassing more than 2000 other student competitors. She is the first Latina to win the competition in 20 years, and one of 26 women who have won first-place in the competition since its inception.

Ana serves on the Board of Directors of Earth Force, a national nonprofit that engages students in project-based learning focused on environmental science and civics. She currently attends Harvard College and plans to joint concentrate in astrophysics and physics and continue researching exoplanets.

KEYNOTE ADDRESS – Shall Not Be Denied: Women Fight for the Vote, Janice E. Ruth, Curator, Library of Congress

Janice E. Ruth, chief of the Library of Congress (LOC) Manuscript Division, where she previously held positions as the assistant chief, manuscript specialist in American women's history, writer-editor, reference librarian, and processing technician, is the curator of the LOC exhibition Shall Not Be Denied: Women Fight for the Vote. She is one of the authors of American Women: A Library of Congress Guide for the Study of Women's History and Culture in the United States (2001), Women Who Dare: Women of the Suffrage Movement (2006), and several Library of Congress websites relating to women's history, including Women of Protest: Photographs from the Records of the National Woman's Party. Ms. Ruth writes and speaks frequently on women's history and archival topics. She is a Fellow of the Society of American Archivists (SAA) and served on their committees that developed the

Encoded Archival Description (EAD) standard for electronic finding aids and authored the EAD Tag Library and EAD Application Guidelines. She holds an M.L.S. and an M.A. in American history from the University of Maryland.

"...high-quality public education is the foundation of a democratic society and the key to improving economic prosperity and gender equality." (2019-2021 AAUW Public Policy Priorities)

It is not news to any AAUW member how integral equity in education is to our mission and our Public Policy Priorities. **Dr. Gregory C. Hutchings, Jr.**, Superintendent of the Alexandria City Public Schools (ACPS), will join us for lunch to talk about these concepts as they are practiced in the real-world laboratory of a public school system. Tasked with a

mission to ensure that "every student succeeds," the ACPS serves 15,000 plus students who come from more than 114 countries and speak 119 languages.

Dr. Hutchings graduated from T.C. Williams High School, the public high school in Alexandria, Virginia, in 1995, and returned to Alexandria 23 years later in July 2018 as ACPS Superintendent of Schools. Between 2013 and 2018, he was Superintendent of Schools for Shaker Heights Schools, located in a suburb of Cleveland, Ohio.

An experienced educator and administrator, Dr. Hutchings has served as a teacher, assistant principal and principal at the middle and high school levels. He began his teaching career in Manassas at Prince William County Public Schools and has worked in Chesterfield County Public Schools, near Richmond, and Nashville Public Schools in Tennessee - where he was named Tennessee Middle School Principal of the Year. He was previously a director of pre-K--12 initiatives and director of middle school programs with ACPS.

Dr. Hutchings holds a bachelor's degree in interdisciplinary studies from Old Dominion University; a master's in educational leadership from George Mason University; and a doctorate in educational policy, planning and leadership from the College of William and Mary. In 2018, he was named Superintendent of the Year by the National Alliance of Black School Educators. He and his wife Cheryl have two school-age children who attend ACPS.

Prior to that, she served as a program officer in the State Department's Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs. She received two Superior Honor Awards, two Benjamin Franklin Awards and the Foreign Service Institute's Adjunct Faculty Award for her work at the State Department, Before her tenure at the State Department, Kendra was a program manager at the League of Women Voters' International Division where she managed women's empowerment initiatives in Russia and Eastern Europe. Kendra holds a BA in Slavic Languages and Literatures from Princeton University and an MA in Russian and East European Studies from the University of Michigan.





We want all children to recognize bias and to be empowered to reach for the stars. It is our hope that by providing this education our girls will not be limited but will strive for roles in our schools and communities that they determine are fulfilling. Co-Vice President for Public Policy Susan Burk



Susan Burk has been a member of AAUW since 2007, and has served as the public policy chair for the Springfield-Annandale Branch. Before joining the AAUW-VA state board, Susan served from 2015 to 2017 on a multibranch AAUW committee supporting STEMtastics, a program of hands-on

workshops for middle school girls. In 2017, she was elected to serve as the Northern District co-representative. In 2018, Susan was elected as co-vice president for public policy, AAUW-VA. During her term, she and her co-vice president, Sylvia Rogers, have increased AAUW-VA's visibility and presence state-wide in support of ERA ratification and closing the gender pay gap, among other issues.

Susan retired from the U.S. Department of State in November 2012 after a 36-and-a-half-year career in nuclear arms control, nonproliferation, and national security policy that included senior level positions in the Office of the Secretary of Defense and the former U.S. Arms Control and Disarmament Agency. She retired after serving as the special representative of President Obama for nuclear nonproliferation, with the rank of ambassador.

In addition to her work with AAUW advocating for equity for women and girls, she currently serves on several boards of non -governmental organizations focused on national security and arms control. She has served as a mentor for next generation national security specialists. She holds a BA in political science from Trinity College, Washington, DC (now Trinity Washington University), and an MA in national security studies from Georgetown University. Susan is married and has two grown, married children and one grandchild.

Co-Vice President for Public Policy Denise Murden

In October 2014, she was awarded the Department of Homeland Security's Secretary's Award for Outstanding Achievement in Diversity Management and, upon retirement in January 2016, the U.S. Coast Guard Commandant's Distinguished Career Service Award.

Denise earned her undergraduate degree in writing and communications from the University of Pittsburgh in 1975 and a master's degree in management from Troy University in 2010, at which time she was also inducted into the Phi Kappa Phi Honor Society.

Public Policy Priorities (Voter Guide Continued)

AAUW OF VIRGINIA PROPOSED 2020–2022 PUBLIC POLICY PRIORITIES

The AAUW of Virginia Board recommends approval of the revised Public Policy Priorities for 2020-2022 as stated below. The proposed policies include those previously identified for 2016-2018 and 2018-2020 but have been expanded to include AAUW national Public Policy Priorities where we believe AAUW of Virginia can play an advocacy role in Virginia. The format of the priorities has been revised to align with the key issue areas outlined in the AAUW Strategic Plan, particularly those that address equality, economic security, and education.

While in 2020, AAUW of Virginia will continue to focus at the state level on the priorities of pay equity and ratification of the ERA, the public policy priorities we are proposing have not been rank-ordered for action. We realize that many branches in Virginia want to engage in raising awareness on other issues such as human trafficking, family medical leave, or Title IX that are relevant to their communities. The proposed priorities reflect the ongoing advocacy efforts of our membership statewide and provide a fuller latitude of opportunities for our ongoing work on behalf of women and girls.

There will be an opportunity for discussion and amendment of the proposed policies from the floor at the annual business meeting in Alexandria prior to being placed on the ballot for members' votes.

Equality, Individual Rights and Social Justice

- Support additional actions, as required, so that the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) becomes the 28th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution
- Support access to civil and constitutional rights, including affirmative action and voting rights
- Support measures to insure fair, nonpartisan redistricting, and transparency in governmentSupport self-determination of women's health decisions, including reproductive rights
- Assure freedom from violence and fear of violence, including bullying, hate crimes, sexual harassment, and human trafficking
 - Advocate for diversity and inclusion as mission-based values

Economic Security

- Support adoption of measures to close the gender pay gap and promote fairness in compensation and benefits
- Support equitable access and advancement in employment and leadership opportunities for women
- Advocate for quality, affordable health care and family planning services, dependent care, and paid family, medical and sick leave
- Support a livable minimum wage standard

Education

- Enforce Title IX and all other civil rights laws pertaining to education
- Provide adequate and equitable funding for quality public education for all students
- Oppose use of public funds for nonpublic elementary and secondary schools and to charter schools that do not adhere to the civil rights and accountability standards required of other public schools
- Promote and protect programs that meet the educational needs of girls and women at all levels, including STEM fields
- Increase support for and access to affordable higher education for women and disadvantaged populations

Shall the AAUW of Virginia Bylaws Be Amended to Eliminate Half-Price Dues Provision for State Dues?

The AAUW of Virginia Board reviewed the state bylaws to reflect best practices and compliance with AAUW, state, and federal standards. The board recommends approval of an amendment to the state bylaws to delete Virginia's half-price dues discount for new members joining a branch between January 1st and March 15th.

Rationale for Proposed Amendment

Commencing with the 2018-2019 dues, national AAUW eliminated its policy to grant a half-price national dues discount to new members that joined between January 1st and March15th (Jan-March Half-Price Dues). This membership enrollment would expire on June 30th of that year. Then the new member would need to pay full dues as of July 1st for membership until June 30th of the following year.

The AAUW of Virginia Bylaws currently includes a provision granting a Jan-March Half-Price Dues discount of \$7.50 for state dues covering membership only until June 30^{th} of the year. The board found that this discount is rarely used, and that there is a better discount for candidates for membership. If someone joins AAUW at a public event after March 15^{th} they can take advantage of national's "Shape the Future" discount of \$29.50 and the new national, state, and branch memberships will continue until June 30^{th} of the <u>following</u> year.

Current Text

Article XVII. Financial Administration

Section 5. Affiliate Dues.

a. Amount. * * *

(6) State Affiliate dues of new Members shall be paid upon joining and shall be forwarded immediately to the state Affiliate's vice president for finance. State Affiliate dues received by the vice president for finance between January 1 and March 15 shall be one half the annual dues.

Proposed Amendment [Deleted text is in red and has a line through it.]

Article XVII. Financial Administration

Section 5. Affiliate Dues.

a. Amount. * * *

(6) State Affiliate dues of new Members shall be paid upon joining and shall be forwarded immediately to the state Affiliate's vice president for finance. State Affiliate dues received by the vice president for finance between January 1 and March 15 shall be one half the annual dues.
