Keynote Address

Progress and Enduring Inequities for Women in Higher Education



Professor Kimberly Jenkins Robinson, JD; Elizabeth D. and Richard A. Merrill Professor at the University of Virginia School of Law; Professor at both the School of Education and Human Development and the Frank Batten School of Leadership and Public Policy at the University of Virginia

As we think about the state of women in higher education, it is important to acknowledge both the historic strides that have been made, as well as the enduring inequities that persist. Progress can be seen in such areas as the number of women graduating from colleges and graduate programs, participating in athletics and demanding an end to sexual harassment and

assault through the Me Too movement. We should celebrate this progress, while also acknowledging enduring inequities for women in higher education, including disparities in STEM majors and careers, disparities in athletic resources and leadership positions, and ongoing sexual harassment and assault. This talk will highlight where progress has been made and emphasize the need for new movements and law and policy reforms that tackle enduring inequities.





10:50 a.m. The Restorative Justice Program at the Gemeinschaft Home

Michelle Roberts, Day Reporting Center Case Manager, Gemeinschaft Home

Organized in 1985, the Gemeinschaft Home is located just outside Harrisonburg in a large, renovated farmhouse. Board member Dr. Elisabeth Gumnior and Case Manager Michelle Roberts will describe how this residential and non-residential program gives individuals who were formerly incarcerated or diverted from incarceration an opportunity to restore a sense of wholeness in their lives by providing quality shelter, food, counseling, job coaching, and a model for daily living and responsible decision-making – all of which are necessary to avoid recidivism. The presentation will focus on the special needs of women in the program.



11:40 a.m. Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Practices at James Madison University and Within the Virginia Community College System

Carla Kimbrough, Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Officer, Virginia Community College System

Dr. Brent Lewis, Associate Vice President for Diversity, Equity and Inclusion, James Madison University

College/university campuses face a special challenge to make progress in addressing diversity, equity and inclusion (DEI) to ensure all students have an equal opportunity to access educational opportunities and be free of discrimination and harassment.

Ms. Kimbrough and Dr. Lewis will discuss the procedures, initiatives, and other actions needed to implement a DEI program on a campus and their recommendations on those actions that are the most successful. The presentation will also include discussion of the intersection of race and gender and the importance of disaggregated data to examine progress or lack thereof.

Models of AAUW and C/U Partnerships

AAUW of Virginia currently has 15 college/university partners in Virginia. The faculty representatives of a C/U partner coordinate with branch members to establish student organizations. Our AAUW of Virginia members, Drs. Green and Sledge, will present practical guidance on how branches can connect with nearby colleges and universities and identify interested faculty in order to establish a partnership between the institution and AAUW. They will also discuss the role of branches in maintaining on-going relationships with C/U partners, promoting applications for AAUW grants and fellowships, supporting AAUW internships, sharing branch programming, and promoting the benefits to women college and university students of joining an AAUW branch.



A Perspective on Early African American Education In the Shenandoah Valley and the Example of Lucy F. Simms

Local Shenandoah Valley native and historian Dale MacAllister will examine post-Civil War education for newly freed slaves in the Shenandoah Valley. Lucy F. Simms, who was born a slave in the 1850s and went on to teach school for 47 years, will be used as an example of one who took advantage of her educational experiences and became a highly successful teacher in her hometown.





The Changing Nature of Virginia Politics: Reviewing the Pivotal 2021 Election and the Legacy of Virginia's First Madam Speaker

Dr. Stephen J. Farnsworth, Professor of Political Science and International Affairs; Director, Center for Leadership and Media Studies, University of Mary Washington

The partisan tides come in and go out in Virginia politics, a place where there are no permanent majorities and no permanent minorities. Dr. Farnsworth will discuss Virginia's pivotal 2021 election and what it says about the future of politics and public policy in Virginia. He will also share his views about the policy legacy of Virginia's first Madam Speaker, who ran the House of Delegates during the past two years — a time of the first Democratic political trifecta in Virginia in a generation.

The hotel will try to accommodate requests for earlier check-in or later check-out, but may charge an additional fee.



<u>Hotel Madison</u> has on-site garage parking for cars and other average-sized vehicles at \$5 per day, per vehicle:

- For guests staying in the hotel, parking charges will be added to their room account. They will be able to use their room key to get in and out of the garage during their stay at the hotel. All they will need to do is tap their room key at the little box when they go to exit, and the gate will lift to let them out.
- For day attendees not staying at the hotel, they can pay the \$5 parking charge at the kiosk in the parking garage, at the front desk, or at the gate on their way out. If they choose to pay at the kiosk or the desk, when they go to exit, they will insert their parking ticket received upon entry, and it will read as paid. If not, they'll insert their ticket, then their cash payment of \$5 at the gate when trying to leave.

There are two electric car charging stations. For oversized vehicles, such as vehicles over 8'2", guests and day attendees will need to call the hotel ahead of their stay to confirm availability in a nearby, off-site location.

- <u>To reach the parking garage from the front of the hotel</u>: Turn right out of the hotel; turn right at the next corner onto Martin Luther King, Jr. Way; and then turn right into the garage to park.
- Handicapped parking spaces are available in the garage.
- Once parked in the garage, there are signs directing how to enter the hotel.

On July 1, 2021, we began the second year of our two-year partnership as the co-presidents of AAUW-VA. There are a few months left until our term ends on June 30, 2022. Thank you for placing your trust in us to lead this incredible organization, especially during what has been an unusually challenging time. We are honored to work with the extraordinarily-talented and resolute members of the state board, as well as those in our branches around the Commonwealth. Together, we have created a new hybrid normal, which combines in-person events when the situation permits and uses technology to bring us closer together when we are far apart. The hidden benefit of Zoom meetings is that they have given us more opportunities than in pre-pandemic days to speak to and meet members from all areas of the state.

Here are highlights of the last year:

- We held a three-day virtual State Conference and Annual Business Meeting featuring 15 amazing speakers in March 2021, who focused on the theme "Women Make the Difference." At least 100 members attended each day, representing 23 of 24 branches. We were finally able to present our prestigious AAUW-VA Woman of Achievement Award to our 2020 awardees--State Senator Janet Howell and Scientist Ana Luisa Tió Humphrey. Because of the 2020 AAUW-VA donation to AAUW Funds, we could recognize for the first time three members as State Named Honorees for furthering the AAUW mission in the state beyond just their branch or community. AAUW Funds Chair Caroline Pickens presented awards to Marion Stillson (Reston-Herndon Area), Patricia (Trish) Wallace (Greater Richmond), and Neola Waller (Virginia Beach). Caroline will recognize the four State Named Honorees for 2021 on March 26, 2022, at the conference.
- We arranged a biennial review of the AAUW-VA financial records by a branch member, not on the State Board, who found that all records were accurate and maintained following sound accounting principles and practices. Because of the pandemic, the State Board's expenditures during the past year were significantly lower than budgeted so the Board was able to give back to our members during this year. We did this by increasing the total amount appropriated for the popular mini-grant program; funding a new initiative spearheaded by our Co-VPs for Public Policy, Susan Burk and Denise Murden—the Reclaim Our Vote postcard-writing campaign targeting under-represented voters; and lowering the conference registration fee for members this year to only \$25, which includes lunch.
- We continued AAUW-VA's advocacy for the passage of the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) by signing on to *amicus curiae* (friend of the court) briefs filed in both the U.S. District Court of the District of Columbia and the U.S. Court of Appeals for the DC Circuit supporting a case filed in 2020 by the attorneys general of Virginia, Illinois, and Nevada-the last three states that ratified the ERA. Regrettably, Virginia's new attorney general withdrew the Commonwealth from the case in February 2022, but the case will continue with Illinois and Nevada as plaintiffs.
- We collaborated with VP for Communications Patsy Quick and the Co-VPs for Public Policy to
 prepare a statement recognizing the 25th anniversary of the U.S. Supreme Court case prohibiting
 Virginia Military Institute (VMI)'s exclusion of women students and supporting a recent outside
 investigation's findings and recommendations that VMI address discrimination based on race,
 sex, and sexual orientation. The statement was sent to elected officials, the press, advocacy
 groups, and AAUW-VA members.

- Because of remote learning classes at colleges/universities (C/U), C/U Chair Barbara Woodlee faced the challenge of multiple non-renewals by former Virginia AAUW C/U partners. She held virtual meetings with branch C/U representatives to discuss methods to reconnect with Virginia's C/U partners and has been successful in reestablishing several partner relationships. We collaborated with Barbara Woodlee and Patsy Quick to develop a branch membership brochure and application that branches can customize and use for their member recruitment activities.
- AAUW-VA is in its third year of a relationship with the Frank Batten School for Leadership and Public Policy at the University of Virginia. Under the mentorship of Sylvia Rogers, Northwest District Representative, one graduate student per year engages in research on issues of importance to AAUW to fulfill their capstone project requirements for their Master of Public Policy degree. Last year, graduate student Catalina Perez's capstone project, "The Economic Impact of the Covid-19 Pandemic on Women in Virginia," documents how covid-19 is compounding pay inequity for working women at a greater rate than for men. Currently, graduate student Marisa Lemma is examining for her capstone research the structural issues that have been, and continue to be, barriers for low-wage earning women to return to the workforce.
- On behalf of AAUW-VA, we submitted letters to the Virginia FOIA Council Electronic Meetings Subcommittee advocating for greater flexibility in allowing for more electronic meetings and electronic attendance at public meetings not only during times of emergency. A bill did pass the General Assembly. We also signed onto the "Transparency VA 2021 General Assembly Report," which evaluated the transparency of legislative operations and the degree of public input into proposed legislative actions during the 2021 General Assembly session.
- Although AAUW-VA's advocacy for our public policy priorities has always been well-respected by
 elected officials and organizations we collaborate with, the Public Policy Co-VPs have advanced
 the Public Policy Program to a stellar level. Although in-person State Lobby Days at the Virginia
 General Assembly and our reception for women lawmakers were again canceled, using virtual
 meetings, collaborations, and coalitions, and by preparing and distributing detailed reports and
 factsheets on legislation, the Public Policy Co-VPs prepared members to make our voices heard in
 Richmond. You will be awestruck when you read their report in this program book.
- Cyndi Shanahan, as the diversity, equity and inclusion chair, has been a powerhouse. She assembled a statewide group of DEI points-of-contacts in our branches, who have worked together to shape a DEI program that is fundamental to everything AAUW-VA does. In January, the virtual panel discussion, "Creating Inclusive Spaces," was fantastic and attracted more than 100 attendees. Cyndi also continued her *de facto* DEI leadership role among AAUW state affiliates by holding sessions with them and AAUW staff, particularly to promote the implementation of the AAUW DEI Toolkit.

Once again, thank you for the honor of serving as your co-presidents for the 2020-2022 term.

Suzanne Rothwell/Leslie Tourigny AAUW-VA Co-Presidents Since July 1, 2020, I have had the honor of serving as the vice president for program. In the summer of 2021, I began meeting with Northwest District Representative Sylvia Rogers, who is the 2022 state conference chair, to plan the March 26, 2022, AAUW of Virginia State Conference. This included developing the conference theme, which is "Going the Distance for Women and Girls" (the logo developed by VP for Communications Patsy Quick); identifying, inviting, and finalizing speakers; and assisting with obtaining biographies, photographs, and contact information for the speakers. Speakers will address contemporary issues of concern to our members, including continuing educational inequities for women, management of diversity and inclusion programs on college campuses, and the leadership women are increasingly providing at all political levels.

I attended district meetings of the Northern and Northwest Districts.

I served on the mini-grants committee for 2021-2022 and collaborated with the other committee members in reviewing branch mini-grant applications, selecting branches to receive mini-grants, and determining the amounts of mini-grants awarded.

I also attended AAUW National webinars on a variety of mission-related subjects.

I hosted on Zoom a brainstorming session attended by branch presidents and vice presidents for program seeking their ideas for the content and format of future statewide meetings organized by the AAUW-VA Board of Directors.

As of February 2022, AAUW of Virginia has 1,012 branch members across our 24 branches, down from 1,049 in February 2021. We are pleased to report that AAUW -VA achieved a 96% membership retention rate, which exceeded the AAUW national retention goal of 90%. Ten branches had the same or more members in 2021 than the year before (100% retention): Greater Manassas, Hampton, Newport News, Portsmouth, Roanoke Valley, Smith Mountain, Vienna Area, Virginia Beach, Winchester, and Woodbridge. Congratulations to those branches, who will each receive a cash award and certificate of recognition! Additionally, 10 more branches successfully met or exceeded the 90% goal: Alexandria, Arlington, Harrisonburg, Lynchburg, McLean Area, Mt. Vernon, Norfolk, Reston-Herndon Area, Springfield-Annandale, and Wytheville. These branches will receive a certificate of recognition. Twenty AAUW of Virginia branches recruited a total of 98 new members between February 2021 and February 2022, with Smith Mountain Branch leading the way with 17 new members.

Cheryl Spohnholtz Vice President for Membership In the second year of a pandemic that laid bare the inequities in our nation, AAUW-VA members showed their commitment to our public policy priorities through grassroots activism and mutual education and support. While our ability to gather in-person continued to be restricted, we made great progress in learning and using other methods of advocacy.

We enjoyed success with our legislative agenda for the 2021 General Assembly session. A limited paid sick leave bill was passed, providing coverage to 30,000, mostly female, home health care workers. Through oral and written testimony, and by lobbying our representatives, we also supported the passage of a bill that authorizes public bodies to conduct electronic meetings and eases some restrictions, and another that requires a comprehensive review of computer science standards, courses, and pathways in Virginia public schools.

Our members' support of our state-wide Reclaim Our Vote campaign was phenomenal! We sent more than 1,500 postcards to underrepresented voters of color with non-partisan voting information. Every district was represented by the 19 branches that participated.

Our continued association with students from UVA Batten School of Leadership and Public Policy has been most rewarding. Catalina Perez completed her research on the economic impact of the pandemic on women and presented her findings at the Northwest District meeting on September 25, 2021. We are pleased that another student has taken on AAUW-VA as her client. Marisa Lemma, already a young, published author, is studying childcare issues for us and will present them at a future meeting. After three years of this relationship, students report they highly value the opportunity to work on women's issues of personal importance while having input and mentoring from experienced women who are members of an organization with a national reputation.

Following an election that changed the composition of the entire Virginia House of Delegates, we sent letters to every re-elected and newly elected member to congratulate him/her and introduce ourselves. We also had State Senator Mamie Locke join us for a virtual discussion of legislative priorities and issues on January 25, 2022.

Throughout the year, our scheduled Zoom meetings gathered a committed group of branch public policy chairs and other interested members into a community of advocates that have learned to leverage online communications and social media to achieve our goals. For the 2022 General Assembly session, we continued our legislative focus on our economic security agenda through active participation in the Virginians for Paid Sick Leave Coalition to expand paid sick days to all workers. We continued to support the passage of a paid family and medical leave program and a salary history ban as a method of achieving pay equity. With our members' input, we expanded the list to include legislation that addresses sexual harassment in the workplace, high-quality childcare, and public education funding. By the end of January 2022, our members were actively engaged in lobbying their elected representatives for these and other legislation that impacts women and families.

Susan Burk/Denise Murden Co-Vice Presidents for Public Policy At its July 2021 meeting, the Board approved a budget of \$2,000 for new public policy mini-grants for 2021-2022. The deadline for applications was September 15, 2021. This was earlier than last year to give branches more time to execute their projects. The Mini-Grant Committee received six applications, both **Tried and True** and **Bold and New**. All applications were funded at some level.

Congratulations to the following branches that were awarded mini-grants for 2021-22:

- Alexandria \$350 to support the development of a human trafficking app (Angel App);
- **Reston-Herndon Area** \$250 to support a *high school essay contest* where students will write about inclusion initiatives they have developed for their school or community;
- Smith Mountain \$300 to support attendance by local girls at a Science Camp for Girls;
- **Springfield-Annandale** \$300 to support the branch's *Student Inclusion Award* to a local high school junior whose DEI essay is selected by a branch committee;
- Woodbridge and Greater Manassas \$400 for Bridging Generations with our Community; Members and Women's Historical Narratives by collaborating with local Girl Scout troops to expose them to women's history through interaction with AAUW members; and
- Wytheville \$400 to support a STEM event for middle school girls with workshops and speakers.

Vision

AAUW of Virginia's state newsletter, *Vision*, is published three times a year and serves as the major source of communication to members. Copy Editor Mary Anne Graham (McLean Area and Winchester) and Layout Editor Bianca Daugherty (Mt. Vernon) edit, and layout articles submitted by the state board and branch members and create a finished product. In March 2021, I opened and began to manage a Mailchimp account (free) for the distribution of the *Vision*. With the fall 2021 edition of the *Vision*, 21 members without email addresses received print copies. This number is declining rapidly from previous years. The *Vision* is also posted on the state website. In January 2022, I updated the "Process for Publishing and Distributing" the *Vision* in collaboration with Mary Anne Graham and Bianca Daugherty.

Website: aauw-va.aauw.net

Since 2018, I have managed the AAUW-VA website. The website provides information to members and visitors about state activities, leaders, and branches, and is updated regularly. In 2021, two items were added to the navigation bar on the website with pages for each: State Named Honoree Nomination and Give. The Give pages have information about AAUW Funds and Legacy Circle.

Branch Websites/Site-Resources

Eighteen branches have managed websites, which they maintain, through AAUW National's Site-Resources organization. Six branches have pages on the state website, rather than maintaining individual websites. I communicate, at least yearly, to remind branches to update their websites. This year, I was asked by three branches to collaborate on ways to improve their websites.

Social Media

AAUW-VA has a Facebook (FB) page managed by Cheryl Spohnholtz (Mt. Vernon). At least eight branches have branch FB pages. At least one branch has a Twitter account. These means of communication are direct and instant to followers who like the pages.

Mailchimp

Since the Mailchimp account was opened, it has been used for informing state members of various state meetings and opportunities. It is also used for distributing the *Vision*. With Mailchimp, the state board less frequently needs to ask branch presidents to forward information. The state board obtained member contact information from AAUW's former Membership Services Database (MSD), which was entered into our Mailchimp account.

Other Means of Communication

Email is the favored means of communication for state board members to each other and branches. I forward emails received via the website to appropriate board members. Because AAUW-VA does not maintain a membership database, sometimes branch presidents are still asked to forward information from AAUW-VA to their members.

This year, I created a Conference 2022 logo, brochure, and state board ad for the conference program book.

Along with members of the committee, I participated in the planning effort led by Sylvia Rogers and Nadine James for a workshop to be offered at the March 26, 2022, State Conference. The workshop will consider best practices in creating and working with student organizations - a workshop that will be most helpful to our committee as we work to build new institutional relationships.

Barbara Woodlee College/University Chair The challenges that the nation continues to experience with racial inequity remind us that the work that we are doing to increase our understanding of diversity, equity and inclusion (DEI) concepts remains critical as a start to the resolution of this issue.

Our branches and districts are each approaching DEI programming in a way that makes sense for their members and their communities. The ideas are creative and innovative and continue to leverage wonderful books, movies, and documentaries available on the subject.

At the National AAUW level, the DEI toolkit continues to improve and be added to with plug and play facilitator guides and webinars. Branches are taking advantage of these resources. The January state-wide meeting attended by over 100 AAUW-VA members was held to further the conversation started within the DEI toolkit on creating inclusive spaces. The speakers provided state members with additional ideas and concepts on this important topic.

During September 2021, branch points of contact were requested to provide their branch DEI plans so that we could learn from one another. Updates to our website and direct emails to DEI points of contact help everyone stay current on DEI activities throughout our state and nation.

Amendments to State Bylaws Requiring Member Vote

No proposed amendments to the AAUW-VA Bylaws were submitted by members to the Board of Directors in response to the call for such submissions in 2021. The Board has recommended that members approve an amendment to the Bylaws to eliminate the requirement that the Annual Business Meeting be held during the State Conference, which will be discussed at the April 2022 AAUW of Virginia Annual Business Meeting. This change requires a vote of the membership. If this Bylaws change is approved, it will apply to the Annual Business Meeting in 2023.

Amendments to State Bylaws in 2021

After the discussion at the Virginia Annual Business Meeting in March 2021, the membership voted to approve an amendment to the Bylaws to replace the diversity, equity and inclusion chair with a diversity, equity and inclusion vice president.

At a December 2021 Special Meeting of the Board of Directors, an additional appointed board position for an administrator was approved. The Bylaws permit the Board of Directors to establish new appointed nonelected board positions (and to appoint members to such positions) without member approval; the Bylaws were amended to reflect the newly appointed position.

At the August 2021, November 2021, and January 2022 meetings, the Board of Directors approved editorial revisions to the Bylaws, which do not require membership approval. The revisions are considered editorial because they do not change the substantive meaning of the Bylaws but reflect current practices of the board, clarify confusing or insufficiently detailed provisions, and address inconsistencies between provisions. These changes and the newly appointed position of administrator are reflected in the restatement of the Bylaws on January 11, 2022, which may be found at: <u>https://aauw-va.aauw.net/library/</u>.

Proposal to Adopt Changes to the Board of Directors Handbook

At the November 2021 Board of Directors meeting, language was added to the Board of Directors AAUW funds chair job description to include the Virginia State Named Honorees Committee and to add the job description for the vice president for diversity, equity and inclusion. The latter reflects the vote of the membership in 2021 to add this elected position to the Board of Directors.

At the January 2022 Board of Directors meeting, minor amendments to the president's job description to reflect the administrator position, addition of a job description for the position, and addition of the AAUW of Virginia Board of Directors Succession Plan¹ into the Board of Directors Handbook were approved.

Bylaws Chair Review of Branch Bylaws Changes

Branch bylaws contain policies and procedures for managing AAUW branch operations. Any branch that proposes to revise its bylaws must submit the proposed revisions for review and approval by the state bylaws chair before approval of any revisions by the branch board and membership.

I am available to assist branches regarding issues of compliance with bylaws and other AAUW requirements.

Five of the six branches in the district participated in the statewide DEI virtual meeting on "Creating Inclusive Spaces." It was an amazing program and gave members a lot to contemplate.

Arlington County is now joining the groups that understand the need for a reliable and strong internet for students that cannot afford the quality internet necessary when any family continues to strive to make ends meet and continues to fulfill learning requirements for each child.

The December holiday luncheon went on with significant adjustments for safety. All who attended were vaccinated and boosted. The meeting was held in a member's home that was spacious enough to be socially distant. Members shared information about the immigrant population in Arlington, and programs to help new arrivals. AAUW attendees brought boxes of cereal to be taken following the luncheon to an Arlington Covid Hero, Mariflor Ventura, to give to needy recipients.

The branch meeting on February 19 was a program about "What joy have you found in this unexpected time, this pandemic?" National Public Radio played a part in this, after the fact. The station collected listeners' statements and shared them on a radio program. The meeting was an effort to renew the positiveness that is needed and encountered daily, with or without a pandemic, of the AAUW mission, advancing equity for women and girls through advocacy, education, philanthropy, and research. Falls Church Area

In May 2021, the Falls Church Area Branch awarded college scholarships to eight local high school seniors. Many are first-generation immigrants. Since 1991, the branch has awarded 155 such local scholarships, totaling \$141,650, in addition to previously endowing AAUW scholarships.

Following a 2020 visit to the Smithsonian exhibit celebrating the passage of the 19th Amendment, and in search of programing that would allow members to meet in person in 2021, the branch got together for a field trip and toured the Turning Point Suffragist Memorial. The monument celebrates the people and events leading up to the ratification of the 19th Amendment. It was dedicated in Lorton, VA on May 16, 2021. AAUW-VA's financial contribution is recognized at the memorial.

This year, the branch rededicated itself to reaching potential voters through the postcard and texting initiative, Reclaim Our Vote (ROV), of the Center for Common Ground. Locally, the branch sent 1,435 postcards urging VA residents to register before the November 2021 VA elections, as part of AAUW VA's-initiative. Voters in other states were also contacted. In January 2022, Roxanne Rucker of ROV spoke to the branch about what's next for ROV, motivating us to continue working on voting rights.

Harrisonburg

The Harrisonburg Branch offered a program in October about the Gemeinschaft Home for Women in Harrisonburg. Individual members donated needed clothes and supplies for the residents. This new residence is for women who have been charged with and/or convicted of nonviolent offenses or are homeless. With enough money raised in the 2020 Vision for the Future Campaign, along with partnerships with local public agencies, Gemeinschaft Home settled on a location to establish a residential program for women in Harrisonburg. There had been no residential services available to women under community supervision or probation in the local area, such as the men's re-entry program already offered at Gemeinschaft Home. The residential program will offer an alternative to incarceration for women in the local community charged with and/or convicted of nonviolent offenses and are facing housing instability or are homeless.

In December, Ashley Robinson spoke about "Open Doors," and the needs of the homeless. In January, the Zoom program was about the work of the Wildlife Center of Virginia and how it rescues, treats, and releases wild animals.

The Great Decisions discussion and the diversity book groups continue to meet monthly via Zoom. Casual Lunches meet regularly in local restaurants for members to get better acquainted and to invite guests who may become potential members.
