Prepare yourself by knowing who is on your ballot by checking out these links: https:// www.vote411.org/ballot and https://ballotpedia.org/Sample Ballot Lookup. We have circulated and posted on our AAUW-VA website a hyperlinked flyer

with key voting dates that we encourage you to share with friends and neighbors. Early voting began on September 23. If you have not already voted, please be sure to plan to do so. Legislation passed in recent years now provides Virginia voters with more ways to vote absentee or in person. While we want to get everyone who is eligible registered to vote, we should recognize that this is the first election when Virginia has same-day voter registration, permitting those who have not registered by



election day an opportunity to cast a provisional vote that can be validated later. That means we can all be encouraging others to register and/or vote right up through election day.

We were overwhelmed with the commitments from our branches to participate in this year's Reclaim Our Vote (ROV) campaign, so much so that we had to seek additional funds to support our plan! Our members have written more than 3,000 postcards to rural voters of color who had no other contact opportunities. Postcard messages ask them to check their voter registration and pledge to vote and provide information on when and where they can vote. Let's all remember to do the same. Help yourself and others make a voting plan.

Membership

Ready for a New Membership Year love fall! It's a time when students are back to school and the weather starts to change.

It's also when AAUW branches usually begin their new year. Our membership year goes from 1 July – 30 June, so if you haven't renewed your membership yet, don't wait any longer! The old Give a Grad a Gift program has been discontinued, but graduates can still get a discount on national membership by joining at a branch event and taking advantage of the Shape the Future discount.

AAUW-VA 2022-2023 Budget

he budget for 2022-2023 was approved with minor changes at the summer 2022 board meeting.

The opening checking account balance was \$46,241.74.

The predicted/budgeted income from dues and checking account interest is \$13,500.

The projected disbursements including board meetings and travel, programs, insurance, and newsletters are \$12,865. We have cut expenses such as the state board meeting in person and other expenses to make the budget balance. As the year goes on, we will make decisions about donations to National and other areas depending on income.

UPDATE

Our members have continued to support our public policy efforts in so many ways. Branches committed to writing 3,000 postcards to Virginia voters of color to encourage them to turn out for the November 8 elections, some branches are holding voter registration drives, and many of you continue to collaborate with us as we plan for the next Virginia General Assembly session that begins on January 12. We held Public Policy Zoom meetings in June and September when we discussed our 2023 legislative and policy agenda and discussed strategies to remain nonpartisan in a partisan world. While a divided Virginia General Assembly, with Democrats in control

of the Senate and Republicans of the House, presents a challenge in developing and passing new legislation, AAUW-VA will focus on protecting the right to abortion, eliminating sexism and racism through legislative and regulatory changes, making high-quality childcare more affordable and available, ensuring full funding for public schools, protecting LBGTQ students, and supporting public school teachers. **We plan to hold a Lobby Day in Richmond on January 19 and will hold a Women Legislators Reception on the evening of January 18.** More details to come, but we hope many of you will mark your calendars now to attend.



Bylaws and Resolutions

Call for Proposed State Bylaws Amendments and Proposed Resolutions



The Bylaws/Resolutions Committee is issuing a call for proposed amendments to the state bylaws and for proposed resolutions to be presented at the AAUW of Virginia Annual Business Meeting to be held in March, 2023. These will be voted on under the One Member, One Vote procedure. Please submit bylaws amendments and resolutions to the Committee Chair by email no later than December 1, 2022, using the contact information provided on the AAUW-VA webpage: https://aauw-va.aauw.net/contact-us/.

A proposed bylaws amendment must include a copy of the original section of the bylaws being amended, a marked-up version showing the specific wording of the amendment, and a clean version showing the language as it would be revised. The bylaws amendment proposal must include a statement of the rationale for the amendment. I am available to assist any member not familiar with the mark-up functions of the computer (also called red-lining).

A proposed resolution must include the specific wording of the resolution, a statement of the rationale for the proposed resolution, and a proposed plan for the implementation of the resolution.

Branch Bylaw Changes and Governance Issues

Branches are required to contact me to discuss any proposed changes to the branch bylaws before approval by the branch board or adoption by branch members so that I have an opportunity to review and provide advice on such changes. I am also available to assist you on other bylaws and governance issues. I can be reached through the above-listed AAUW Virginia webpage.

The committee reviews all nominations and may recommend to the state board a nominee for each \$500 contributed to AAUW Funds by AAUW of Virginia. The **McLean Area Branch** is focusing this year on A Call to Action. Members will be investigating how to increase the branch's impact on the issues and barriers affecting girls and women in the classroom and workplace. Members will be identifying organizations to collaborate with and organizations to which members can offer time, energy, and money to help level the playing field for girls and women. The branch will also be planning a new signature fundraising event to support its philanthropic activities.




