n January 10, 2023, Lane and I had the pleasure of participating in a visit with the president and provost of the University of Lynchburg with the state chairs for College and University Partnerships, Barbara Woodlee and Cyndi Shanahan. The meeting was also attended by Angela Cooper, Sr. Manager, Connect and the Advancement & Partnerships Department, and Katrina Sun Breese, Senior Director of Institutional Advancement, both from National. This was such an important meeting because it led to a partnership between AAUW and the University of Lynchburg. Secondly, this visit reinforced the importance of building better relationships and partnerships with neighboring community colleges and universities. I would like to share a few lessons learned.

One of the best ways to increase membership, expand public policy outreach, and improve efforts around diversity, equity, inclusion, and belonging is to create collaborations with institutions of higher education. Branches might think of college students as natural feeders for new members. We should also think about administrators, staff, and faculty as potential outreach for membership. Often, administration or faculty members might join and contribute their expertise to your branch. They might also encourage other colleagues from neighboring institutions to become active in some way.

Universities can also offer important resources for branches. Faculty members might serve as speakers on important and timely issues for branches to discuss current events related to public policy or to share research relevant to women and girls. Branches can also reach out to departments to support STEM and Work Smart initiatives through interactive projects or workshops.

Branches can consider ways to co-sponsor lectures on campuses or plan workshops or training in coordination with women and gender studies programs or departments. Branches can also support access to period products and campus community care closets. Some branches already offer financial support to women who are returning to college while others offer small scholarships for books or other materials.

Our organization is founded on connections between university women, so there is already a point of the alliance built into our mission. Hopefully, we can encourage all Virginia branches to set a goal to make a connection with a local college or university in 2023.

On AAUW-VA Lobby Day, 25 members and other supporters from around the state joined us for a day of advocacy with our elected representatives in Richmond. Focusing on reproductive rights, economic security for women and families, and workplace and education issues, our advocates contacted more than 50 delegates and senators, leaving them with much to consider. **Senator Louise Lucas** introduced AAUW-VA in the Senate, and **Delegate Brianna Sewell** did so in the House, giving every General Assembly member an understanding of our deep roots in advocating for equity for women and girls in Virginia.

Our advocacy continues throughout the General Assembly session, which ends on February 25, and beyond as we also will be following and advocating for our issues during budget special sessions. Members play a key role by calling and emailing their representatives and responding to other action alerts as they are sent out. Bylaws/Resolutions Committee Report

Call for Proposed State Bylaws Amendments and Resolutions

A call for the submission of proposed AAUW-VA Bylaws amendments and resolutions to be considered at the AAUW-VA Annual Business Meeting on March 25, 2023, was published in the fall issue of the AAUW-VA *Vision*, with a deadline of December 1. No submissions were received.



Approval of AAUW-VA Strategic Plan for 2023 - 2025

The AAUW-VA Board of Directors at its January 9, 2023, meeting approved revisions to the AAUW-VA Strategic Plan that had expired on June 30, 2022. In particular, the revised General Statement establishes that the AAUW-VA Board of Directors will devote its resources to promoting diversity, equity, inclusion, and belonging for all members to advance opportunities for all members of the community. The new Strategic Plan is available at https://aauw-va.aauw.net/library.

Approval of New AAUW-VA Diversity and Accessibility Policy

The AAUW-VA Board of Directors at its January 9, 2023, meeting approved amendments to the Diversity Policy in the AAUW-VA Board of Directors Handbook, which establishes a new Diversity and Accessibility Policy (D&A Policy). The updated Handbook is available at https://aauw-va.aauw.net/library.

The D&A Policy provides useful guidance to members on implementing diversity, equity, inclusion, and belonging (DEIB), which includes accessibility. The significant aspects of the new D&A Policy are the following:

- 1. membership campaigns shall stress the positive impact and power of a diverse and inclusive membership and shall use a variety of approaches to attract a diverse population;
- programs shall include, when possible, information that enhances members' knowledge of DEIB; collaboration with other organizations that expand diversity; and sincere efforts to include speakers of diverse backgrounds;
- 3. planning for activities shall be organized to be inclusive and welcoming by using sincere efforts to identify any problems related to accessibility and suitability and address any problems through various means that include consulting with the AAUW-VA Vice President for DEI; and
- 4. AAUW-VA and branches are subject to continuing obligations to:
 - a. promote DEIB objectives in all aspects of governance and policy documents and the operations of boards and committees; and
 - b. conduct periodic reviews of governance, policy documents, and activities for compliance with DEIB objectives, and make any necessary adjustments.

Branch Bylaws Amendments

Branches must contact me to discuss any proposed changes to their bylaws so that I have an opportunity to review and provide advice on such changes before approval by the branch board or adoption by branch members. I look forward to collaborating with branches on such changes and am available to provide advice on interpretations of bylaws and other governance matters.

We will let you know when the link to the electronic ballot is emailed to members so that, in case you do not receive the email, you can check your email junk or spam files.

Erica Brown-Meredith, program coordinator for the Collaborating with Lancers for Academic Success Program (CLASP) and assistant professor for the Baccalaureate of Social Work Program, is the director of a student success program at Longwood University that specifically targets first-generation, limited-income, racial/ethnic minority, and transfer students, utilizing a culturally responsive coaching model and ethnocentric counseling approach. Her scholarly and teaching interests include academic advising and equity in higher education for first-generation, limited-income, minoritized racial and ethnic, and transfer students; women of color in higher education; diversity, equity, and inclusive instructional and curricular pedagogical practices at a white institution; and proactive advising practices in social work education programs.

Erica holds bachelor's, master's, and doctoral degrees in social work and has served as a certified school social worker. The Global Community for Academic Advisors (NACADA) named her an emerging leader honoree. Erica has made profound influences on the practice of academic advising in the form of conference planning, local and national presentations, global webinars, and institutional consultation services.

This year alone, Erica earned several professional awards of distinction: Faculty Citizen Leadership Award and Advocate of the Year, Professional Excellence and Devoted Service to Students Award, and NACADA Outstanding Advising Program Award. Erica joined the Greater Richmond Branch in 2020 and serves as the membership VP.

\Rightarrow Candidate for Co-VP for Diversity, Equity and Inclusion – Meg Tucillo

Meg Tuccillo is currently the co-vice president for diversity, equity, and inclusion and is seeking a second term. She has been a member of the Arlington Branch since 2010. During this time, she has served three terms as branch co-president, three terms as vice president for program, and chair of the scholarship committee since 2014.

She retired in 2012 as assistant superintendent for Arlington Public Schools, where she had previously served as an elementary school principal. In her work as assistant superintendent, she also served as the school system's Title IX coordinator and provided diversity training for school administrators. Meg also serves as chair of the Arlington Community Foundation Workforce Development Committee, providing STEM summer fellowships to Arlington teachers, and as a member of the Chamber of Commerce Workforce Development Council. Meg is excited about the prospect of working together with Erica Brown-Meredith on the valued issues of diversity, equity, and inclusion as part of AAUW's mission.

Laura Southall was born in Vineland, NJ, and grew up in Brooklyn, New York City, and Stony Brook, Long Island, NY. She received both her BS and MS degrees in Applied Math and Statistics from the State University of NY at Stony Brook and became a computer programmer at Harris Corp, and then Northrop Grumman, both on Long Island. Shortly after her daughter was born in 1993, her family moved to Richmond, VA. In 2016, she moved to Smith Mountain Lake. Since 2006, she has been working remotely for the finance department of a private benefits administration company based in Madison, WI. In the past, Laura served as the secretary of the local PTA and is currently the secretary for the local American Legion Auxiliary post, and the Vice President for membership for the Smith Mountain Branch.

Her passion for education started early. As the oldest child of immigrants, she was told that a college degree was her ticket to success, and her choice of major would surely solidify that success and would also mean financial security. Keynote Address

African American Women: The Long History of Advocacy and Their Quest to Safeguard Their Families and Communities



Dr. Cassandra Newby-Alexander is the Endowed Professor of Virginia Black History and Culture, Director of the Joseph Jenkins Roberts Center for the Study of the African Diaspora, and former Dean of the College of Liberal Arts at Norfolk State University in Virginia.

African American women were the leaders and builders in their communities, whose intricate network of supporters enabled the successful coordination of efforts that unlocked some of the most severe forms of discrimination and prejudice. Cassandra Newby-Alexander will discuss the long history of advocacy among African

American women over the past 400 years, providing a few examples of how so many defied "the great man leadership model" through their bravery, agency, and determination.

Inspiring and Retaining Young Women in STEM Fields



Dr. Marissa A. Rice, Postdoctoral Associate, Behavioral and Evolutionary Neuroscience, Department of Human Development at Cornell University and a member of the Virginia Beach Branch.

Young women and girls continue to be vastly under-represented in STEM fields. However, research has shown that girls are more than capable of succeeding in STEM domains. Dr. Rice will share evidence-based behavior science techniques as well as insights from her own journey in the sciences.

The Alexandria Branch has been highly active. The Diversity Book Club and Great Decisions discussion group reach into the community, as does our work with Northern Virginia Community College. In November, members discussed and toured Together We Bake, which helps women in very difficult circumstances. Members met virtually with the Alexandria City School Board Chair Meagan Alderton and Vice-Chair Jacinta Greene in October.
