Keynote Address

"African American Women: The Long History of Advocacy and Their Quest to Safeguard Their Families and Communities"



Dr. Cassandra Newby-Alexander is the Endowed Professor of Virginia Black History and Culture, Director of the Joseph Jenkins Roberts Center for the Study of the African Diaspora, and former Dean of the College of Liberal Arts at Norfolk State University in Virginia.

African American women were the bridge leaders and builders in their communities, whose intricate network of supporters enabled the successful coordination of efforts that unlocked some of the most severe forms of discrimination and prejudice. Cassandra Newby-Alexander will discuss the long history of advocacy among African American women over the past 400 years,

providing a few examples of how so many defied "the great man leadership model" through their bravery, agency, and determination.

"Inspiring and Retaining Young Women in STEM Fields"



Dr. Marissa A. Rice, Postdoctoral Associate, Behavioral and Evolutionary Neuroscience, Department of Human Development at Cornell University, and a member of the Virginia Beach Branch.

The Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) fields will account for some of the fastest growing — and highest paying — jobs of the future. Although research has shown that girls are more than capable of succeeding in STEM domains, young women and girls continue to be vastly under-represented in STEM fields. It's also a myth that girls aren't interested in science. Dr. Rice will share evidence-based behavioral science techniques as well as insights from

her own journey in the sciences.

"Creating Great Public Schools for Every Student"



Laura Goren, Director of Research and Education Policy at The Commonwealth Institute (TCI) for Fiscal Analysis, which includes leading TCI's analysis on education funding and supporting community-based partners in their education advocacy on key issues facing communities of color and lowincome families.

AAUW's deep roots in advocating for quality public education for all go back to our national founding in 1881. Today there are multiple visions of the roles of the Commonwealth, school districts, educators, and parents in public

education. Thanks to the hard work of students, teachers, and parents, many of Virginia's students are doing well despite the tremendous challenges of the past few years. But the state isn't doing its part to make sure every student in every zip code has access to a great education. Laura will discuss the current problems caused by underfunding, the need for adequate and equitable resources for every student, and some of the nuts and bolts of Virginia budget process and budget advocacy.

"The Unknown Glorious Herstory of AAUW"



Caroline Pickens, past state president and a co-founder of the AAUW Archives Corps, will take us back for a look into AAUW's herstory and some of the remarkable work we've done to promote the education and protection of the rights of women and girls. Did you know AAUW issued its first pay equity report in 1913? Why does AAUW have a letter from Albert Einstein? When and why did the United Nations give AAUW permanent observer status? What was the African Educators Program? Caroline will provide answers to these questions and provide insight into other areas of AAUW as she engages us in our "herstory."

- We're expanding how we think about college/university partnerships.

Vice President for Program Report

It has been an honor to continue to serve as the vice president for program. I have been working collaboratively with Southeast District Representative, Tammie Mullins-Rice, and a committee of members representing area branches, to plan the March 18, 2023, AAUW Virginia State Conference. This included developing the conference theme, which is "Embracing Our Herstory, Moving Forward" (the logo developed by webmaster Patsy Quick); identifying, inviting, and finalizing speakers; and assisting with obtaining biographies, photographs, and contact information for the speakers. Speakers will address contemporary issues of concern and topics of interest to our members, including women's history, women's advancement in STEM education, and public policy in a post-Covid environment.

I attended the Northern District meetings.

I served on the mini-grants committee for 2022-2023 and collaborated with the other committee members in reviewing branch mini-grant applications, selecting branches to receive mini-grants, and determining the amounts of mini-grants awarded.

I also attended AAUW National webinars on a variety of mission-related topics.

I continue to seek ideas regarding the content and format of future statewide meetings organized by the AAUW-VA Board of Directors.

Vice President for Membership Report

As of February 2023, AAUW-VA had 960 branch members across 24 branches, down from 1,012 in February 2022. We are pleased to report that this represents a 95% membership retention rate, which exceeded the AAUW national retention goal of 90%. In 2022, the Suffolk Branch voted to merge with the Portsmouth Branch, so in 2023 the number of active branches will drop to 23.

Eight branches had the same or more members in 2023 than the year before, which either indicates 100% retention or the acquisition of new members: Greater Manassas, Hampton, Portsmouth, Roanoke Valley, Smith Mountain, Springfield-Annandale, Vienna Area, and Wytheville. Congratulations to these branches. They will each receive a cash award and certificate of recognition!

Additionally, 11 more branches successfully met or exceeded the 90% goal: Arlington, Fairfax City, Falls Church Area, Harrisonburg, Lynchburg, McLean Area, Mt. Vernon, Newport News, Norfolk, Reston-Herndon Area, and Woodbridge. These branches will receive a certificate of recognition. Twenty AAUW of Virginia branches recruited a total of 117 new members between February 2022 and January 2023, with Smith Mountain Branch leading the way with 18 new members. McLean Area, Roanoke Valley, and Vienna also had 10 or more new members each.

Co-Vice Presidents for Public Policy Report

The digital skills AAUW-VA members have learned over the last three years have led to better coordination of our efforts and more frequent contact with our elected representatives. Our branches hosted Zoom meetings with their elected representatives throughout the year, and our online public policy meetings were well attended. Members wrote more than 3,000 postcards encouraging infrequent voters of color to get to the polls.

Following the legislative successes of the 2022 General Assembly session, we continued to push paid family and medical leave, paid sick days, and salary history ban legislation. We also opposed education vouchers and saving accounts that would divert funds away from public schools and, following the overturning of Roe v. Wade, renewed our efforts to protect and expand reproductive rights.

AAUW-VA took public stances on several issues, including objections to the expressed views of the Virginia Department of Health commissioner regarding racial disparities in healthcare, the Governor's push to divert education funding to laboratory schools, and the revision of proposed history and social science standards for Virginia schools developed under the previous administration.

We expanded our reach with continued membership in the Paid Sick Days Coalition and joint activities with the League of Women Voters of Virginia and the National Women's Political Caucus of Virginia. We were accepted for membership in the Fund Our Schools coalition late in the year. We held a very successful in-person Lobby Day in Richmond in January 2023 where 25 members reached out to 80 elected officials. Nothing was more telling about the growing awareness of AAUW-VA and the impact of our advocacy than the loud applause and recognition our members received when introduced on the floors of both the Virginia House and Senate.

Public Policy Mini-Grants Report

AAUW-VA's mini-grant program continued to support branch projects that align with our public policy priorities throughout the Commonwealth. The State Board approved \$1,500 for 2022-2023 mini-grants, and the summer 2022 *Vision* provided information for applying online. Applications were due by September 15. The Mini-Grant Committee assessed four applications based on:

- Innovation/creativity
- Community outreach
- Support of AAUW priorities
- Recruitment value
- Collaboration with others
- Financial need
- Value of outcomes

While two of the branches received amounts less than requested, all were able to start their projects with the grants. Branches were informed of their awards on November 15:

- **Reston-Herndon Area**: \$200 for the Diversity, Equality, Inclusion, and Justice Essay Award program for high school students.
- **Smith Mountain**: \$100 to establish a scholarship fund to reimburse students pursuing STEM degrees for college application fees.
- *Virginia Beach*: \$800 to hold an event for female high school softball players to meet Wesleyan University players to learn about Title IX and its importance for women's athletics.
- Wytheville: \$400 to support a community STEM event for middle school girls.

All branches awarded a mini-grant must complete their projects by June 30, provide a short report after completion of their activity, and submit all receipts by July 15, 2023.

Vice President for Communications Report

AAUW-VA Website and Branch Websites

Serving in her sixth year as the website manager, Patsy Quick (Mt. Vernon) provides information to members and visitors to the state website (aauw-va.aauw.net) regarding state leaders' activities and state and branch events and accomplishments. In 2022, working with the public policy co-VPs and DEI co-VPs, pages for each area were added to the website. Eighteen branches have managed websites supported through AAUW's Site Resources, while six branches have pages connected to the state website. At a minimum, the web manager communicates with branches annually to offer support in keeping their websites updated. Branches often ask the communications team to collaborate with them on ways to improve their sites.

Social Media

AAUW-VA maintains a Facebook (FB) page managed by Cheryl Spohnholtz (Mt. Vernon). Eight branches have FB pages and at least one branch has a Twitter account. Although keeping Twitter active at the state and branch levels has proven to be problematic, we are exploring the feasibility of participating on other social media platforms.

Email and MailChimp

Email continues to be the most useful means of communication within the state board and with the branches. The web manager monitors the state website and forwards emails received to the appropriate board member/s. A MailChimp mass mailing account was originally established for the distribution of the digital version of the state newsletter to all members. We have found it to be useful in sending messages regarding various meetings, events, and opportunities to our members. We are currently exploring alternative mass mailing options in looking for more flexibility and cost-effectiveness.

Vision

The state newsletter, *Vision*, is published three times each year and serves as a major means of communication with over 1,000 AAUW-VA members, as each receives a digital copy. Mary Anne Graham (McLean Area and Winchester) serves as copy editor responsible for reviewing and editing articles submitted by the state board and branch members, while Layout Editor Bianca Daugherty (Mt. Vernon) arranges the information for both the online and print formats. Printed copies are sent to members without email addresses. *Vision* is also posted on the state website and stored in the state's online archives. In 2022, the communications team updated the guidance document, "Process for Publishing and Distributing the *Vision* (2022)," which has been successfully implemented this year.

We will conclude the year with another college/university representatives meeting to further explore ideas for expanding this effort across the state.

Co-Vice Presidents for Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Report

Issues regarding diversity, equity, and inclusion, and also belonging, continue to be areas of great interest and concern throughout this year. Much has been done in these areas in AAUW across the nation but much continues to be needed. In Virginia, we are fortunate to have many DEIB representatives in our branches working with their leadership to help ensure we are not just writing a statement about DEIB but incorporating these aspects into our work. We met with representatives across the state in the fall (via Zoom) to share ideas and resources, discuss ways to be inclusive in our meetings through actions like providing closed captioning for Zoom, and beginning our meetings by recognizing the land where we are meeting belongs to the Indigenous peoples who lived here before America was settled by Europeans.

In February, we held a statewide Zoom presentation by the non-profit organization Challenging Racism for branch and state leadership and DEIB branch representatives on developing a diversity, equity, inclusion, and belonging culture within our branches. Executive Director of Challenging Racism Alicia Jones McLeod shared handouts on common language around race and conversation guidelines for DEIB discussions.

We plan to meet again this spring with branch representatives to hear about what went well and what might be focus areas for next year.

Bylaws and Resolutions Chair Report

AAUW-VA Bylaws Amendment Adopted in 2022

Virginia members voted to approve a proposal presented at the 2022 AAUW-VA Annual Business Meeting that amended the state bylaws to eliminate the requirement that the mandatory annual business meeting must be held during the state conference. This change allows greater flexibility in arranging these two different statewide meetings.

Approval of AAUW-VA Strategic Plan for 2023 - 2025

The AAUW-VA Board of Directors approved revisions to the AAUW-VA Strategic Plan that had expired on June 30, 2022. Among other things, the revised General Statement establishes that the AAUW-VA Board of Directors will devote its resources to promoting diversity, equity, inclusion, and belonging (DEIB) to advance opportunities for all members of the community.

Approval of New AAUW-VA Diversity and Accessibility Policy

The AAUW-VA Board of Directors approved amendments to the Diversity Policy in the AAUW-VA Board of Directors Handbook to establish a new Diversity and Accessibility Policy (D&A Policy). The D&A Policy is intended to provide useful guidance to members on implementing DEIB by:

- identifying and addressing the many aspects of DEIB (including accessibility) that are integral to the operations
 of the AAUW state and branch affiliates and district activities;
- enhancing sensitivity to accessibility issues for all persons, regardless of whether considered to have a disability; and
- clarifying and expanding on the obligations of the AAUW-VA and Virginia branches as well as the district representatives to incorporate DEIB and accessibility into their decision-making for all activities.

Other Revisions to the Board of Directors Handbook

The AAUW-VA Board of Directors also approved the following changes to the AAUW-VA Board of Directors Handbook.

- 1. The job description for the Board's position of vice president for finance was revised to include current good practices to assist later occupants of that position.
- 2. The procedures for the members of the Board to conduct liaison activities with branches were added to the Handbook.
- 3. The reimbursement amounts for hotel and driving expenses for board member travel were changed from \$40 to \$50 per night and \$0.30 to \$0.40 per mile, respectively.

State Board of Directors Submits Comment to AAUW on Proposed National Bylaws Amendments

The AAUW of Virginia Board of Directors submitted comments to AAUW regarding the proposed national bylaws change to delete the 60-day notification period to members before the AAUW Board voting on a dues change, which issue also relates to the way bylaws amendments are adopted. The state's comment recommended that AAUW amend the member dues and bylaws provisions to specifically establish a minimum 21-day comment period for members when national proposed amendments to member dues or the bylaws. The Board recommended that bylaws amendments thereafter be published once more to members with a minimum 30-day notification period before the date of the vote on the amendments. The state pointed out that, as an organization built upon an affiliate membership structure, AAUW should demonstrate that members' comments are considered by AAUW before final action by the AAUW Board on these important matters.

The job of the historian is to "retain AAUW of Virginia historical records and papers significant to the history of the AAUW of Virginia...until the completion of the state history." There is a list of necessary documents and reports including "reports of significant AAUW of Virginia projects and trends."

In the past year, a new AAUW of Virginia Bylaws has been written and added to the archives along with a new AAUW of Virginia Board of Directors Handbook. Both documents are fluid and can be revised whenever necessary.

Another of my jobs is to help branches with decisions about their archives. Don't hesitate to ask for my help. There are still three copies of our most recent state history, "The History of the American Association of University Women of Virginia 1925-2010," most recently updated by Neola Waller (Virginia Beach). All Districts Meeting

On October 22, 2022, we made AAUW of Virginia "herstory" by holding our first All-District Meeting, courtesy of Zoom. Members from 23 of our 24 branches—all four of our districts—attended the meeting and met AAUW Chief Executive Officer Gloria Blackwell.



Gloria recognized AAUW-VA's achievement as the first state affiliate to earn five stars in the 5-Star National Recognition Program. She presented an AAUW update and answered questions from our members. She told us that AAUW met its 2022 fundraising goals; increased programming outreach to girls and women of color; presented salary negotiation training to nearly 190,000 participants; and continued our highly esteemed fellowships and grants programs to support women. She said that in 2023, our renowned National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL) would, once again, be an in-person event.

Following Gloria's presentation, AAUW-VA members heard reports from AAUW-VA board members. After these presentations, each district met separately in Zoom breakout rooms.

Leslie Tourigny Northern District Co-Representative

Northern District

Northern District branches held two meetings in the spring of 2022. One was held at the State Conference in Harrisonburg on March 26, 2022, to elect the new Northern District Co-Representatives for 2022-2024. The other was a special meeting initiated to discuss how district branches may collaborate on initiatives and programs with other AAUW branches and other organizations within the community.

District branches worked hard in getting out the vote for the November 8, 2022, election. They wrote postcards for Reclaim Our Vote (ROV) to increase African American voter turnout and supported voter registration and education efforts organized by the League of Women Voters (LWV) of Arlington, Alexandria City, and the Fairfax Area. On National Voter Registration Day, September 20, 2022, Northern District members helped the Fairfax LWV register voters at public libraries in Fairfax County. Branches co-sponsored a virtual LWV-hosted Meet and Greet on October 2, 2022, with candidates for the

Arlington County Board of Supervisors and the Arlington County School Board, as well as a candidate forum for the Virginia 8th Congressional District on October 13, 2022.

A large cadre of members from Northern District branches participated in the AAUW-VA Lobby Day in Richmond on January 19, 2023. Members visited the offices of many General Assembly legislators to discuss AAUW priorities for the 2023 legislative session.

ALEXANDRIA (VA) BRANCH The Alexandria Branch of AAUW was chartered on May 12, 1945. Dr. Martha Rinsland, who had previously organized 12 branches, served as its first President. In the 1980's the Branch was active in providing a network of translators or service providers, such as doctors and lawyers, for the immigrant community needing services in forty languages. Herstory with STEM Arlington Branch



Each year we are inspired by our students sharing their research projects in science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) in Arlington Public Schools Science Fair. Using STEM research, we evaluated and identified 8 winners from a field of middle and high school participants who conducted studies to answer rea life questions. A high school junior brought pulmonary infections to our attention; another explained different responses horses give to violin music; a soccer player shared health implications if the soccer field used a different artificial turf; and a worm was identified that makes the best composting soil. A number of these student winners are recipients of AAUW's scholarships for higher learning, and more specifically, in STEM education.

An Arlington high school graduate with a strong foundation in STEM became an astronomer, and currently is teaching physics at the US Naval Academy. She is also president of Arlington's David Brown Planetarium. Last year, when it was in danger of losing needed funding for a teacher position and a new projector, she met with us to ask for our support. Our members along with a number of Arlington science teachers persuaded the school board to fund both the teacher position and new projector. 


