

Artsy Afternoon in Goodview



PUBLIC POLICY

From Janet Byrne, Public Policy Liaison

Current volunteer member activity: Reclaim Our Vote (ROV) get out the vote postcard writing campaign. Mailing postcards September 8-October 25, 2023.

Our branch has eight volunteers writing and mailing out 330 postcards to encourage identified infrequent voters in designated Virginia voting districts. These messages identify priority topics for voters to link up with legislators campaigning in their specific districts. The postcard messages show topics important for women and families. Candidates are not endorsed since all get out the vote activity is nonpartisan and is policy promoting.

This Virginia General election year features all delegate and state senator positions up for election. **Early Voting** begins 9/22/2023; **Election Day** is 11/07/2023.

On another topic, I would like to share a note sent to AAUW staff from the Archivist about **AAUW's rich history of working for pay equity for women**. To celebrate Women's Equality Day in August, Jessica Miller wanted to highlight the early days of AAUW's work on pay equity. Jessica's historical account, with links to documents in the AAUW Archives, follows:

In collaboration with the Massachusetts Bureau of Statistics of Labor, AAUW released its first <u>report</u> on women's salary in 1896, *Compensation in Certain Occupations of Women Who Have Received College or Other Special Training*. AAUW collected employment and salary information from members for analysis by the Bureau.

Many women described their experience in the survey, explaining how they experienced or witnessed pay inequity like the following:

"Men oftener than women have to support others. In spite of this, I cannot see why a man should be paid \$200 more than I am paid to do the same work when he does it no better."

"When I was doing office work, I received \$6 a week and kept the books and was a typewriter too. If a man had been employed for this work, his pay would have been \$15 a week and he would not have been required to perform the general office work. He would have been a professional bookkeeper, however, which I was not."

"Women are fearful of asserting their inherent rights, standing as they now do, on the verge of freedom. The time, however, is not far off when women will have a voice in making just laws for themselves and others, and this will no doubt have an effect in securing equal remuneration for equal services to both sexes."

In 1913, according to a <u>report</u> by the DC Branch of AAUW, women's salaries in federal jobs were approximately 77.5 percent of men's. Men, on average, were paid \$1,079 annually, and women were paid \$837 for similar work in similar positions, which did not indicate the difference in salary between white women and women of color.

Every post-war Congress had an equal pay act introduced, and AAUW supported each one. Equal pay had become a wartime and post-war issue due to the influx of women workers into jobs previously held by men. In 1945, AAUW endorsed and supported the first federal equal pay legislation, S. 1178, HR 5221, The Women's Equal Pay Bill.

Yet, ten years later, in 1955, AAUW was still advocating and supporting each equal pay bill introduced to Congress while women made an average of 65 cents to every dollar a man earned.

The Equal Pay Act, signed by <u>JFK</u> in the company of AAUW <u>members</u>, wouldn't come until 1963.

Of course, AAUW has learned a lot about and <u>continues</u> to advocate for pay equity to this day. The archives are full of great information and records relating to our pay equity work, if you're interested in learning more, feel free to stop by!
