A Long Petal of the Sea: A Novel by Isabel Allende

A gorgeously devastating tale of the immigrant experience housed in the historical context of the Spanish Civil War. In the late 1930s, civil war grips Spain. When General Franco and his Fascists succeed in overthrowing the government, hundreds of thousands are forced to flee in a treacherous journey

over the mountains to the French border. Among them is Roser, a pregnant young widow, who finds her life intertwined with that of Victor Dalmau, an army doctor and the brother of her deceased love. In order to survive, the two must unite in a marriage neither of them desires. Together with two thousand other refugees, Roser and Victor embark on the SS Winnipeg, a ship chartered by the poet Pablo Neruda, to Chile: "the long petal of sea and wine and snow." As unlikely partners, the couple embraces exile as the rest of Europe erupts in world war. Starting over on a new continent, they face trial after trial, but they will also find joy as they patiently await the day when they might go home. Through it all, their hope of returning to Spain keeps them going. Destined to witness the battle between freedom and repression as it plays out across the world, Roser and Victor will find that home might have been closer than they thought all along.

The Dictionary of Lost Words by Pip Williams

Esme is born into a world of words. Motherless and irrepressibly curious, she spends her childhood in the Scriptorium, an Oxford garden shed in which her father and a team of dedicated lexicographers are collecting words for the very first Oxford English Dictionary. Young Esme's place is beneath the sorting table, unseen and unheard. One day a slip of paper containing the word "bondmaid" flutters beneath the table. She rescues the slip and, learning that the word means "slave girl," begins to collect other words that have been discarded or neglected by the dictionary men. As she grows up, Esme realizes that words and meanings relating to women's and common folks' experiences often go unrecorded. And so she begins in earnest to search out words for her own

dictionary: the Dictionary of Lost Words. To do so she must leave the sheltered world of the university and venture out to meet the people whose words will fill those pages.

Based on historical documents, this is a historical fiction account of how a teenage girl produced indigo dye, which became one of the largest exports out of South Carolina, an export that laid the foundation for the incredible wealth of Southern families who still live on today. Although largely overlooked by historians, the accomplishments of Eliza Lucas influenced the course of U.S. history. George Washington served as a pall bearer at her funeral.

We will celebrate Mother's Day on May 12th, 2024. It is an official holiday celebrating motherhood and the accomplishments of women. This is also a day that took many years and a lot of dedication to

How are West Virginia, Wanamaker's, abolitionists, suffragettes, Union and Confederate soldiers, President Woodrow Wilson, and Anna Jarvis all related to the history of Mother's Day?

In the 19th century Ann Maria Reeves Jarvis of West Virginia started "Mother's Day Work Clubs" to help women learn how to take care of their children. In 1868, she also organized "Mother's Friendship Day". During this time mothers got together with former soldiers from the Union and the Confederacy to help the men reconciliate. Julia Ward Howe (an abolitionist and suffragette) wrote a "Mother's Day Proclamation "calling mothers together every June 2nd to promote world peace. Juliet Blakely (a temperance activist) inspired a local

Mother's Day in Michigan. Mary T. Sasseen and Frank Herring worked to organize Mother's Day in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. John Wanamaker provided financial aid and sponsored a Mother's Day event in 1907 in one of his Philadelphia retail stores. Anna Jarvis, daughter of Ann Jarvis, organized a celebration on the same day in Grafton, West Virginia, at the Methodist Church to honor her mother's lifetime of activism. These events were successful and repeated in 1908. Jarvis wanted this day to be added to the national calendar. She utilized letter writing and talking to prominent politicians to get the message out that American holidays at that time were focused on male accomplishments. In 1914, President Woodrow Wilson signed a bill making it official that the second Sunday in May would be celebrated as Mother's Day. By 1920, Anna Jarvis-unmarried and childless-was working in the floral industry and became upset with the fact that the holiday that she wanted to honor her mother had become so commercialized. She tried to have it removed but was unsuccessful. Mother's Day continues to be celebrated today in the United States and around the world. Ann Maria Reeves Jarvis and Anna Jarvis receive credit for their dedication to women and the establishment of this treasured holiday.


