President's Message <u>Pat Kadel</u>

One cold February day, my daughter came home from preschool thrilled to share that she had learned all about George Washington and his good friend, Ibbadan Hickman. It took me a few moments to realize that George's friend was Abraham Lincoln who was born almost ten years after our first president had died!

Her excitement stirred my own childhood memories of celebrating George Washington's birthday every February. From 1879 until 1970, we celebrated George Washington's Birthday on his actual birthday, February 22. The birthday of Abraham "Ibbadan" Lincoln on February 12, was almost an afterthought, since most people were far more interested in exchanging gifts, flowers, cards or candy two days later.

Since the enactment of the Uniform Monday Holiday Act in 1970, we have celebrated what is now known as President's Day on the third Monday in February and the idea of a day solely dedicated to George Washington is all but forgotten. While I've never complained about a three-day-weekend, I still miss the lessons and celebrations when it exclusively honored our first president.

While the day was grossly commercialized and our childhood lessons were mostly fiction, it was then a day off from work. Many communities, especially in Virginia, had parades, special events and even fireworks on that day. We shared in the excitement of searching for the "best deals" at George Washington Birthday Sales and ate cherry pie. Washington was held in high esteem, certainly more than a mere

mortal might deserve, and in elementary school we learned tales that taught us about loyalty, compassion, and, especially, honor.

As we got older, we learned more about Washington's specific contributions and dedication to the creation of our country. Many of those accomplishments may seem outdated after over 200 years; but the leadership, beliefs about democracy, and dedication to the nation, of the man who was eulogized as, "First in war, first in peace, and first in the hearts of his countrymen" may be more important today than ever before.

What became known as his "Farewell Address to the Nation", is considered one of the most important documents in American History. Intended to serve as an inspiration and guide for future generations, Washington wrote about the importance of national unity while warning Americans of the political dangers of regionalism, partisanship and foreign influence, which they must avoid to remain true to their values.

The following are a few quotes from Washington's Farewell Address that are surprisingly appropriate today:

• I hold the maxim no less applicable to public than to private affairs, that honesty is the best policy.

- If in the opinion of the People, the distribution or modification of the Constitutional powers be in any particular wrong, let it be corrected by an amendment in the way which the Constitution designates. But let there be no change by usurpation; for though this, in one instance, may be the instrument of good, it is the customary weapon by which free governments are destroyed.
- Citizens by birth or choice, of a common country, that country has a right to concentrate your affections. The name of AMERICAN, which belongs to you, in your national capacity, must always exalt the just pride of Patriotism, more than any appellation derived from local discriminations.
- However [political parties] may now and then answer popular ends, they are likely in the course of time and things, to become potent engines, by which cunning, ambitious, and unprincipled men will be enabled to subvert the power of the people and to usurp for themselves the reins of government, destroying afterwards the very engines which have lifted them to unjust dominion.

Lobby Day

Lobby Day started on the evening of Wednesday, January 15, 2025, with a briefing from Alex Blocker of the Fund Our Schools coalition (https://fundourschoolsva.org). This is a statewide coalition of "parents, students, teachers, and organizations who believe that every child in every zip code across the Commonwealth of Virginia should have access to a high-quality public education. Alex asked that we ask our legislators to support SB 1977, which restores full funding to K-12 schools. Funding was reduced in the wake of the 2008 housing market crash and the caps put in place at that time remain. Virginia has long recovered from that specific economic downturn, so sufficient numbers of support staff, defined in the standards as pretty much anyone other than classroom teachers, should be restored.

On Thursday morning, Becki joined past state president Kristin Moyer from Vienna, visiting her

legislators first. They were very welcoming and supportive of AAUW issues. Becki and Kristin then visited the Winchester legislators. They first spoke with Senator French's legislative aide and nephew, Jacob French, who was interested in what we had to say and indicated that he would pass along the AAUW fact sheet for the day. We were specifically asking for support for SB1977 that would rework the education standards of quality formula to establish full funding for public K-12 schools. Jacob asked if we were familiar with SB1149, a similar bill that Senator French had co-sponsored, but we were not. SB1149 also reworks the standards of quality formula. We can track the progress of each bill here: https://lis.virginia.gov/bill-details.

We then went to Del. Wiley's office and met briefly with him. I told him we were specifically asking for support for that one bill and why it was needed. For example, a cap was placed on school support personnel, defined as anyone not a teacher basically, during the 2008 budget crisis that followed the housing market meltdown. Virginia hasn't been in recession since that recovery, so it's time to remove that cap. My argument to him was that education is just as vital for a kid who is going to go be an electrician as it is for the college bound, because you need to be able to read a set of plans. He concluded our meeting after about 10 minutes and seemed less than supportive, to be honest.

300 Children's Books in Spanish: A Multi-Organization Project

At the December 14 members' meeting, approximately 10 members attended the program showcasing a collaboration among Winchester AAUW and several local organizations. 2025 is the 100th year anniversary of the Virginia AAUW, and, in keeping with the theme of One Hundred, our branch planned to donate 100 children's books in Spanish to Winchester Little Libraries. Board members agreed at the August 21 meeting that we would support the local Little Libraries organization by donating 100 children's books in Spanish to be placed in neighborhood libraries. Rosemary Green is on the Executive Board of the HJH Libraries for All Foundation, and she contacted the director, Jane Mirandette, immediately to request 100 children's books in Spanish. Jane responded with the pledge to donate not 100 books, but 300 books! The books were entirely free, and Marsha Gochenour's employer Fabritek covered the shipping costs.

Program speakers were Allie Mondell, interim director of Winchester Literacy Volunteers https://lvwa.org/ and representative for Winchester Little Libraries https://lvwa.org/winchester-little-libraries/; Ori Largent, representative for Leyendo Juntos https://lvwa.org/family-literacy-in-the-community/leyendo-juntos/; Pat Kadel, president of the Winchester Branch of AAUW; and Rosemary Green, board

member <u>HJH Libraries for All</u> Foundation.

Winchester Literacy Volunteers is the parent organization that





coordinates Winchester Little
Libraries and Leyendo Juntos. HJH
Libraries for All Foundation is a
small 501c3 organization that
sponsors literacy projects in
Nicaragua. The children's books in
Spanish will be distributed among
neighborhood Little Libraries in
Winchester and in school and
community programs sponsored by
Leyendo Juntos.

Two of our recent scholarship recipients, Sarah Morris (2024, Orndoff Performing Arts Scholarship); and Briyit Hernandez (2024, Froehlich Scholarship) attended the meeting, where they were welcomed warmly.


