"On March 27-28, 1925, there assembled in Williamsburg, Virginia, a group of Virginia women, called together as delegates from the already existing local branches of the American Association of University Women, with the intent to form a Virginia State Division of the organization.... When the meeting adjourned at four o'clock that afternoon of March 28th, the Virginia Division of AAUW was a reality. Already there appear in the minutes of that meeting some of the same interests which have occupied and still occupy the minds of the members of the local branches and of the State Organization today. There are apparent an interest in working in the state for bringing about legislation for an increase in funds for the state supported schools and an interest in the pre-school age for which the AAUW even had a tentative programme formed. There were in the state at that time seven local branches..." Richmond, Norfolk, Lynchburg, Sweet Briar, Charlottesville, Roanoke, and Williamsburg. Transportation In and Out of Alexandria

SHERATON SUITES OLD TOWN

1. YOU CAN DRIVE.

When you reach the Sheraton Suites Old Town, and turn into the driveway, you will notice a parking garage to the left. For those staying at the hotel, the parking rate per night is \$28. For those attending the conference and not staying at the hotel, parking in this same garage is \$6.00 per hour, for a maximum of \$32 for the day.

As an alternative, if you are lucky and persistent, some of the on-street parking restrictions on some streets near the hotel are not in effect from Friday night through the rest of the weekend, i.e., the parking is FREE if you can get it!

2. YOU CAN TAKE AMTRAK.

Trains from various locations throughout Virginia stop in Alexandria. There is only one Amtrak stop in Alexandria (ALX), which is at the <u>Alexandria Union Station</u>, 110 Callahan Drive, Alexandria. The train station is only 1.6 miles from the Conference hotel. The quickest and easiest transportation to the hotel and then back to the station is a taxi, Uber, or Lyft.

3. YOU CAN TAKE LOCAL WASHINGTON, DC AREA PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION.

TO THE CONFERENCE

Take either the Metro yellow or blue line to the **Braddock Road Metro Station** in Alexandria. That station is only .6 miles from the hotel. There are multiple ways to get from the Braddock Road Metro Station to the conference hotel:

By bus: Go to Bus Bay D on the curb outside of the station and take either the Alexandria Dash Bus (https://www.dashbus.com) # 30 bus or the #31 bus. The bus is free, and it is a short ride to the hotel along Madison Street. Get off the bus at N. St. Asaph Street, which is at the corner of Madison Street. After exiting the bus, turn left, and cross N. St. Asaph Street facing the Harris Teeter store. Then make a left turn and cross Madison Street. It is a very short walk to the hotel at 801 N. St. Asaph Street.

By alternate means: You can also take a taxi, Uber, or Lyft from the metro station, or walk the .6 mile from the Metro to the hotel.

RETURNING TO THE METRO

By bus: You can take a free Alexandria Dash Bus back to the Braddock Road Metro Station by exiting the hotel and turning right onto N. St Asaph Street. Cross at the next corner, Montgomery Street, and then cross N. St. Asaph Street. There is a bus stop sign about a third of the way down the street on the curbside. Take the first bus that comes, either the #30 or #31, for a short ride to the station.

By alternate means: You can also take a taxi, Uber, or Lyft from the hotel or walk the .6 mile from the hotel to the Braddock Road Metro stop.



1. <u>Alexandria Celebrates Women</u> (ACW) Women's History Walking Tour, guided by ACW Co-Founder and Vice President Gayle E. Converse. ACW is a volunteer 501(c)(3) charitable non-profit organization that recognizes the accomplishments and contributions of Alexandria's women of the past, present and future.


This two-hour walking tour is free, but advance registration was required. This tour follows an accessible route through historic Old Town Alexandria and will stop at many of the sites associated with a wide array of diverse and courageous women who have been an integral part of Alexandria's history. One stop will be the site of the former federal courthouse in Alexandria where, in 1917, the suffragists who were arrested for picketing in Washington, DC and then imprisoned in the DC Workhouse in Occoquan, were tried and released. The AAUW Alexandria Branch received a mini-grant from AAUW-VA to contribute to placing the historic marker at this site.

Another stop is the present-day Kate Waller Barrett Branch Library (originally called the Alexandria Library), which was the site of the 1939 library sit-in. This was one of the country's earliest civil rights sit-ins. You'll also hear more about the sit-in during one of the conference presentations on Saturday, March 29.

Before you head back to the hotel, there will be a stop so you can purchase some ice cream to see for yourself why *Forbes Magazine* named Alexandria the Ice Cream Cone Capital of the U.S.!

2. <u>Freedom House Museum</u> This tour costs \$4.00 and advance payment and registration was required.

The Freedom House Museum, owned by the City of Alexandria, is located at 1315 Duke Street. The Duke Street building was once the headquarters of Franklin and Armfield, the largest domestic slave trading firm in the United States. From 1828 to 1861, traders trafficked tens of thousands of enslaved adults and children through the building that today houses the museum. Taken from their families, these individuals were forced to the slave markets in the deep South by foot or ship to be sold. This museum honors the lives and experiences of the enslaved and free Black people who lived in and were trafficked through Alexandria.

"No person in the United States shall, on the basis of sex, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any education program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance."

These 37 words begin Title IX of the Educational Amendments of 1972—one of the most consequential civil rights laws in United States history. Widely known for creating opportunities for women and girls in athletics, Title IX does this—and so much more. It prohibits sex discrimination in all areas of education and assigns enforcement authority to the United States Department of Education. Since Title IX's passage, opponents have sought to weaken it. Faced with a changing conversation, our panel of experts will help us look back on the 50 plus years under Title IX and help us chart our advocacy actions for the future—beginning now.

1:15 p.m. Rose Dawson, Alexandria Library Executive Director, speaks about how "The 1939 Alexandria Library Sit-In Still Changes the Conversation."

In 1937, the City of Alexandria, Virginia, built the Alexandria Library. Although it was the only library in the city of 33,000 residents, entrance and use was limited to "Whites Only." Even though African Americans lived in the city and paid taxes, they were not allowed to use the library. On August 21, 1939, one-by-one, five young African American men entered the library, and asked to register for a library card. What happened next changed the conversation—not only for the five young men, not only for a day, and not only for Alexandria. Our speaker, Rose Dawson, the current Alexandria Library Executive Director, recognizes and honors this legacy of courage. "We are the Alexandria Library Sit-In" commemorated the 80th anniversary of the Sit-In, and was recognized with the American Library Association's 2020 Excellence in Library Programming Award. Rose Dawson will share with us how the 1939 Alexandria Library Sit-In continues to change the conversation.

AAUW of Virginia President Lane Stone



Lane Stone is currently in her second term as AAUW of Virginia State President and previously served on the State Board as College/University Chair. She has been associated with AAUW for 20+ years—first as a national member and then as a member and officer of the Alexandria Branch. In her four years as Alexandria Branch president, she fostered a close collaboration between the branch and the Women's Center at Northern Virginia Community College and served on the Center's External Advisory Board. The branch supported the "Women Helping Women" program run by First Lady Jill Biden, who taught at the college for many years. Lane is a graduate of Georgia State University and serves on the university's political science department advisory

board. She has a post graduate certificate in Antiquities Theft and Art Crime.

Lane is a published author. Her works include the *Tiara Investigation Mysteries, Maltipoos Are Murder*, the *Pet Palace Mysteries, The Collector, The Canvas*, and *Dead Men Don't Decorate*, which happens in Alexandria. When not writing, Lane enjoys traveling and volunteering for good causes.

Keynote Speaker Congresswoman Jennifer McClellan (VA-04)



Jennifer McClellan entered the U.S. Congress in 2023. A lifelong Virginia native, McClellan was born in Petersburg to educator parents. After graduating high school as class valedictorian, she earned her undergraduate degree from the University of Richmond, where she served as a Charter member of the Rho Rho Chapter of the Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. She then obtained her Juris Doctorate from the University of Virginia School of Law. McClellan has served the greater Richmond area in elected office for nearly twenty years. She was first elected to the Virginia House of Delegates in 2005 and served in that post until she was elected to the Virginia State Senate in 2017.

In Congress, she sits on the House Armed Services Committee and the House Science, Space, and Technology Committee. A principled and progressive legislator, McClellan has always worked to ensure Virginians' voices are heard in government. Throughout her eighteen sessions in the Virginia General Assembly, McClellan passed over 370 pieces of legislation, including landmark bills to protect and expand voting rights, combat climate change, preserve reproductive health care, and enhance workers' protections and labor rights. McClellan lives in Richmond with her husband, David Mills, and their two children.

City of Alexandria Mayor Alyia Gaskins



Alyia Gaskins, a tenacious fighter for families, communities, and health equity, is the first African American woman to serve as the Mayor of the City of Alexandria. She was sworn in on January 2, 2025, and is dedicated to building a healthier, more prosperous Alexandria for all.

Mayor Gaskins' many accomplishments during her prior three years on City Council include leading the charge to expand access to affordable housing support and quality job opportunities; give public safety officers the tools—like body-worn cameras—they need to do their job; expanding the availability of early care and educational services; passing two historic collective bargaining agreements for police and firefighters that make significant increases in employee pay and staffing; and funding critical

infrastructure such as stormwater management and flood mitigation, increased transit options, and broadband expansion.

The same issues that motivate Alyia as an elected official—health, housing, education, public safety, and the economic, social, and physical vitality of cities— have motivated her professional career as a public health strategist and city planner. She has worked on hunger policy at D.C. Hunger Solutions and health issues at the National League of Cities, managed an affordable housing investment program at the Center for Community Investment, and was most recently a Senior Program Officer at the Melville Charitable Trust, a national philanthropic organization devoted to ending homelessness. Currently, Alyia runs her own consulting business, CitiesRX, which focuses on building physical, social, and economic health through community partnerships.

Mayor Gaskins graduated from Vanderbilt University, where she majored in medicine, health, and society. She earned a master's degree in public health at the University of Pittsburgh and further honed her policy chops with a master's in urban planning at Georgetown and a Professional Certificate in Municipal Finance from the University of Chicago.

The Changing Conversation about Title IX



Kenyora Johnson is the CEO of End Rape on Campus (EROC). With a decade of experience, she has collaborated with youth, families, college students, administrators, and leaders such as the late Mayor Thomas M. Menino, Boston, MA, and Congresswoman Ayanna Pressley (MA-7th). Before EROC, Kenyora worked in nonprofits and higher education institutions like Brandeis University, Strong Women, Strong Girls, and Simmons University. Currently, on the advisory board of Culture of Respect, a National Association of Student Personnel Administrators (NASPA) initiative, Kenyora has held roles such as President of the African-American Alumni Association of Simmons University, Vice-Chair of The

Institute for Research on Male Supremacism, Advisory Board member of The Every Voice Coalition, and the Alumni Association Board at Boston University's School of Social Work. She's a recognized voice on anti-campus sexual violence, featured in major media, and honored by IGNITE National as a "Leader on Fire" in 2021. Kenyora is an alumna of the 2023 Roddenberry Foundation Fellowship.



Emma Grasso Levine is the Senior Manager of Title IX Policy and Programs at Advocates for Youth. In this role, Emma manages Know Your IX, a survivor-and youth-led project that empowers students to end sexual violence in schools. Emma holds a degree in Dramatic Writing and Social & Cultural Analysis from NYU, where they focused their thesis on transformative justice and community-based solutions to gender violence. Previously, Emma has successfully organized to create school-based policy change, improve Title IX trainings and processes to

be inclusive of LGBTQI+ students' experiences, and provide free menstrual hygiene products to students. Emma has successfully trained thousands of students and advocates on how to organize to end gender violence and create survivor-centered policy change. As a national expert, Emma has provided expertise on gender violence in schools to news outlets across the country.



Kalina Majercak is AAUW Advocacy Manager at the American Association of University Women (AAUW), and is based in Washington, D.C. At AAUW, Kalina manages grassroots advocacy and cultivation of AAUW's Action Network nationally, supports state public policy leaders across the states, and leads national voter engagement campaigns.

In her previous role as AAUW's Policy Associate, Kalina supported the Policy & Member Advocacy team as well as AAUW's global initiatives and engagement with

the United Nations. Kalina holds a B.A. in sociology and women's and gender studies from Georgetown University.



Shiwali Patel is a nationally recognized Title IX expert and leads advocacy addressing gender-based harassment in schools, including sexual harassment and sexual assault. Her work also focuses on strengthening civil rights protections for LGBTQI+ students, advocating against censorship in schools through the proliferation of book and curriculum bans, and addressing other issues of gender equity in education. Previously, she was at the U.S. Department of Education, Office for Civil Rights (OCR), where she worked on civil rights policy and

legal guidance interpreting Title IX's anti-discrimination protections, including schools' responsibilities in responding to sexual harassment, protections for transgender students, and the rights of girls of color. Before joining OCR, Shiwali was an Administrative Judge and investigator at the U.S. Department of Energy, Office of Hearings and Appeals; a Special Assistant United States Attorney in the District of Columbia in the Sex Offense and Domestic Violence Unit; and a law clerk to the Honorable Laura A. Cordero at the Superior Court for the District of Columbia. Prior to law school, Shiwali was a community educator at the District of Columbia Rape Crisis Center, where she conducted workshops and educational presentations for adults and young people on sexual assault, domestic and dating abuse, and sexual harassment, and was a trained hotline counselor and hospital advocate. Shiwali graduated from Boston University and American University Washington College of Law, where she is an adjunct law professor.

Rose Dawson has held the position of Executive Director of the Alexandria Library in Alexandria, Virginia, since 2008, after serving as the deputy director for three years. 




The Commonwealth currently recognizes 11 Indigenous tribes. The tribes that inhabited Northern Virginia and the area that is now the City of Alexandria were parts of or allies with the powerful Powhatan Confederacy.

We are changing the conversation, redirecting the thinking, illuminating the territory, advancing what's fair.


We applaud all—






Eliza Scidmore: AAUW member, 1921




